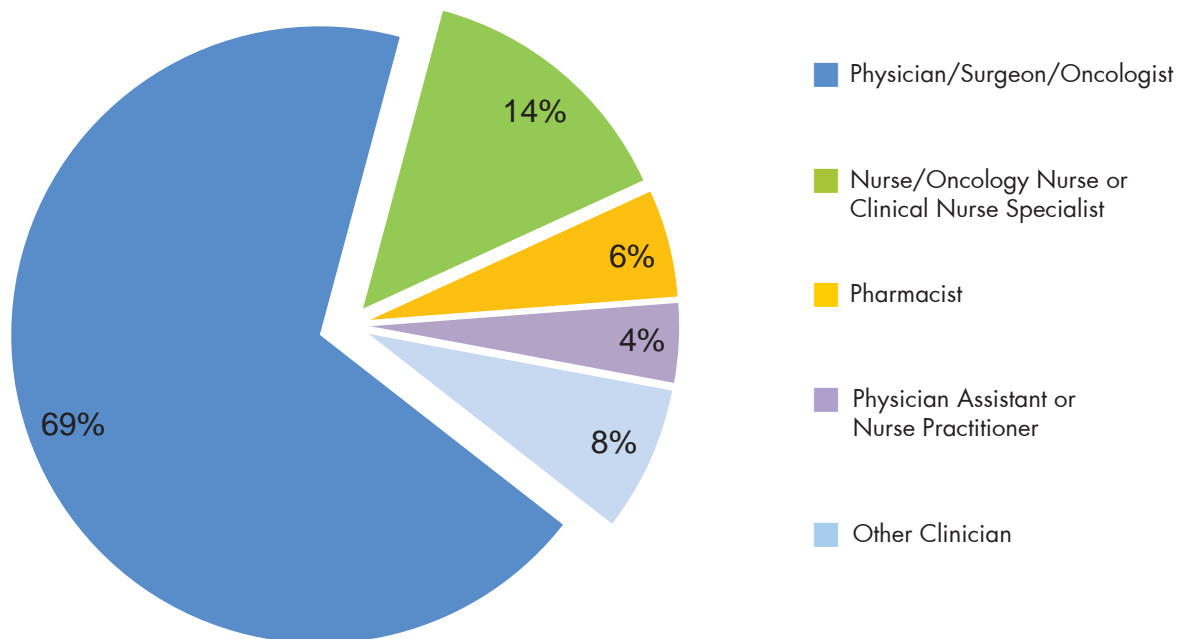

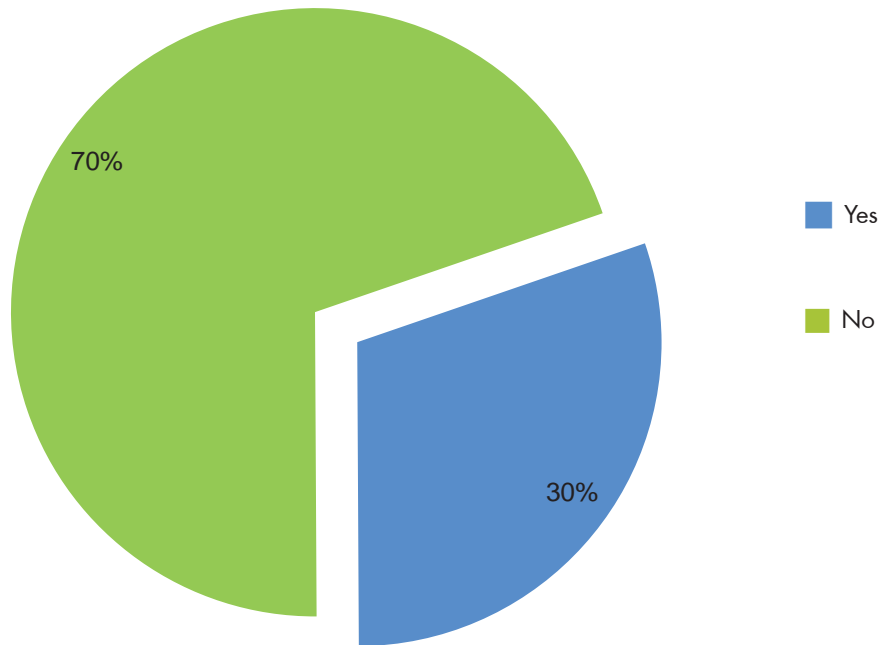

Distribution of Respondent Types (n = 1,616)

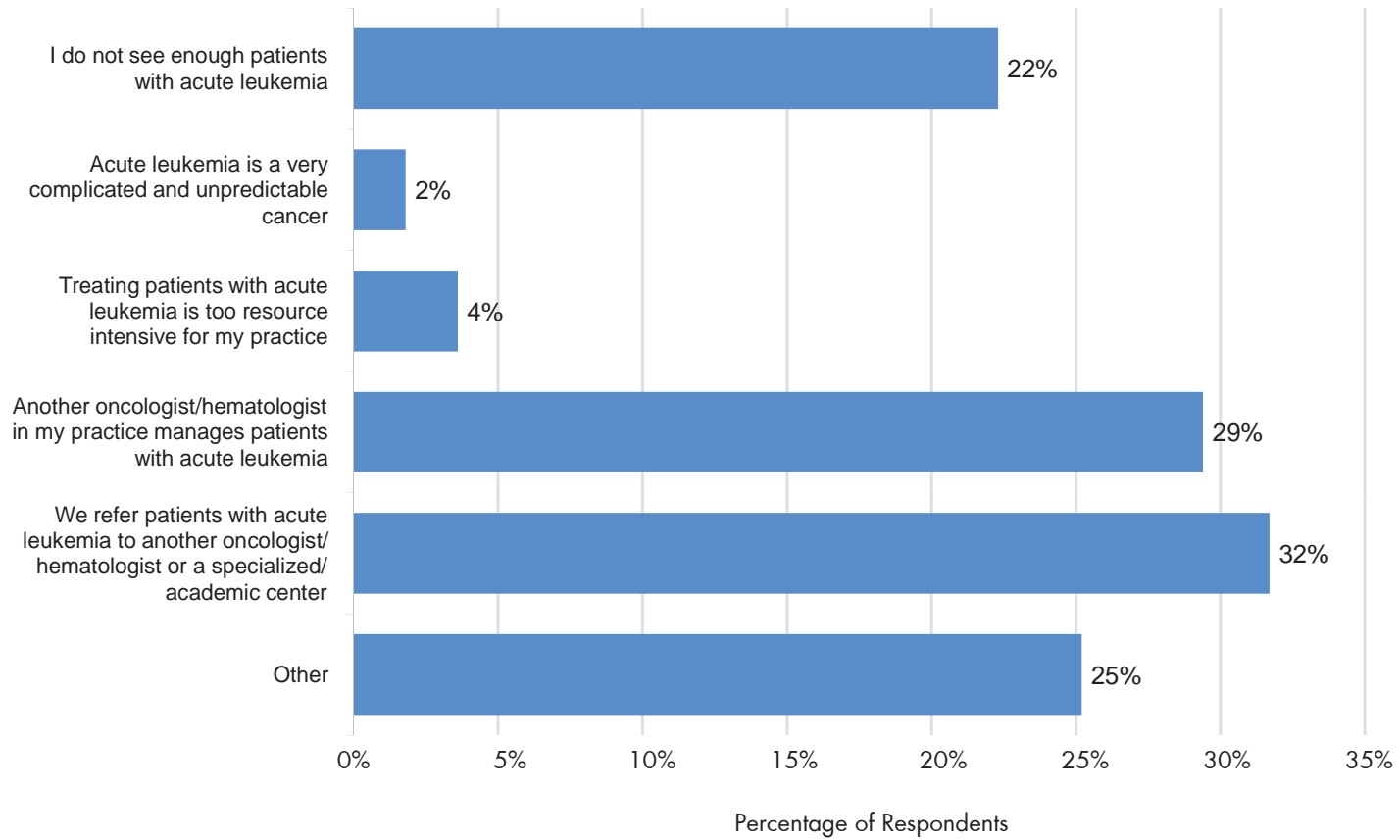

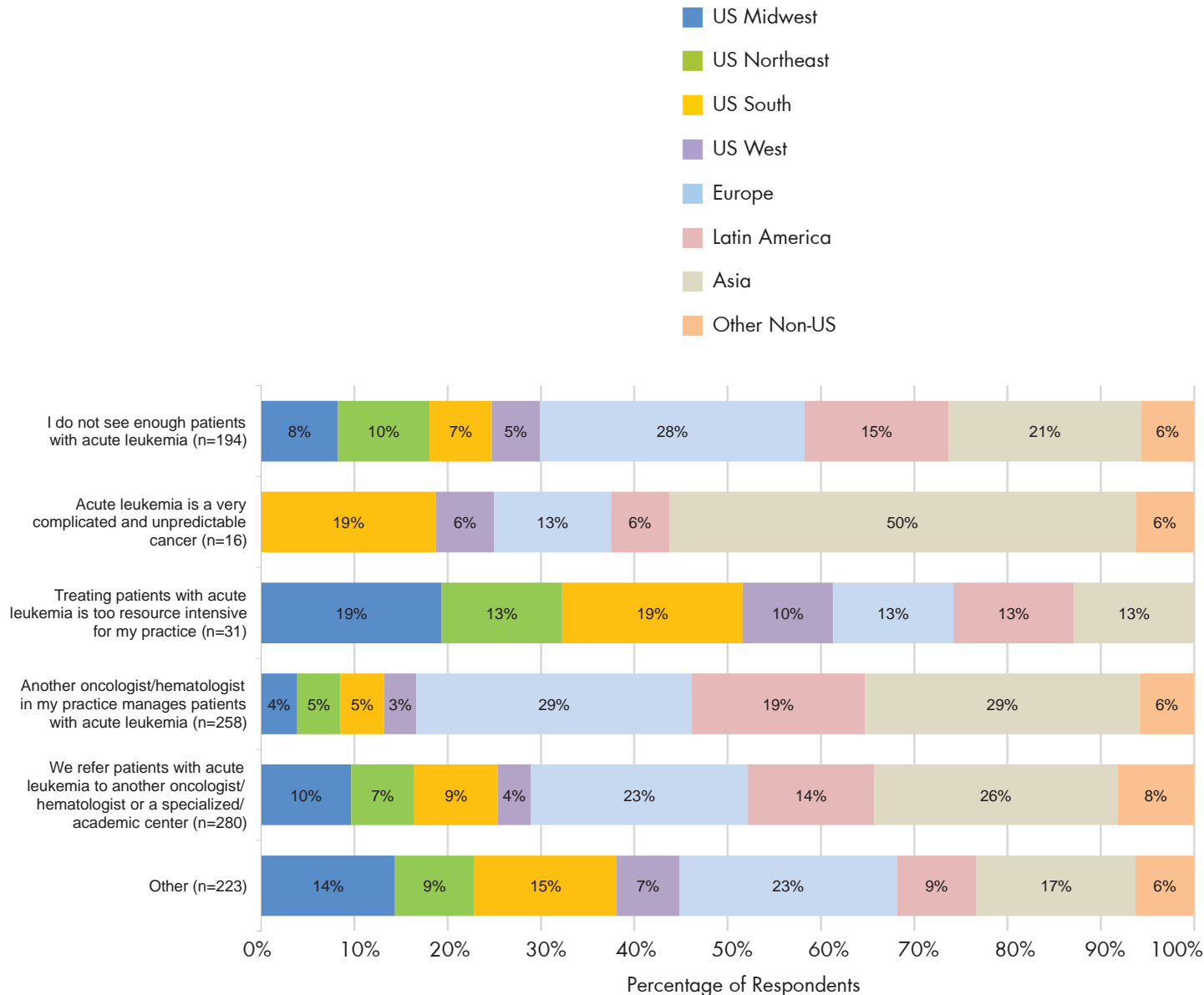


Q2. Please select your reasons for not managing patients with acute leukemia in all phases of their therapy: (Select all that apply) (n = 898)

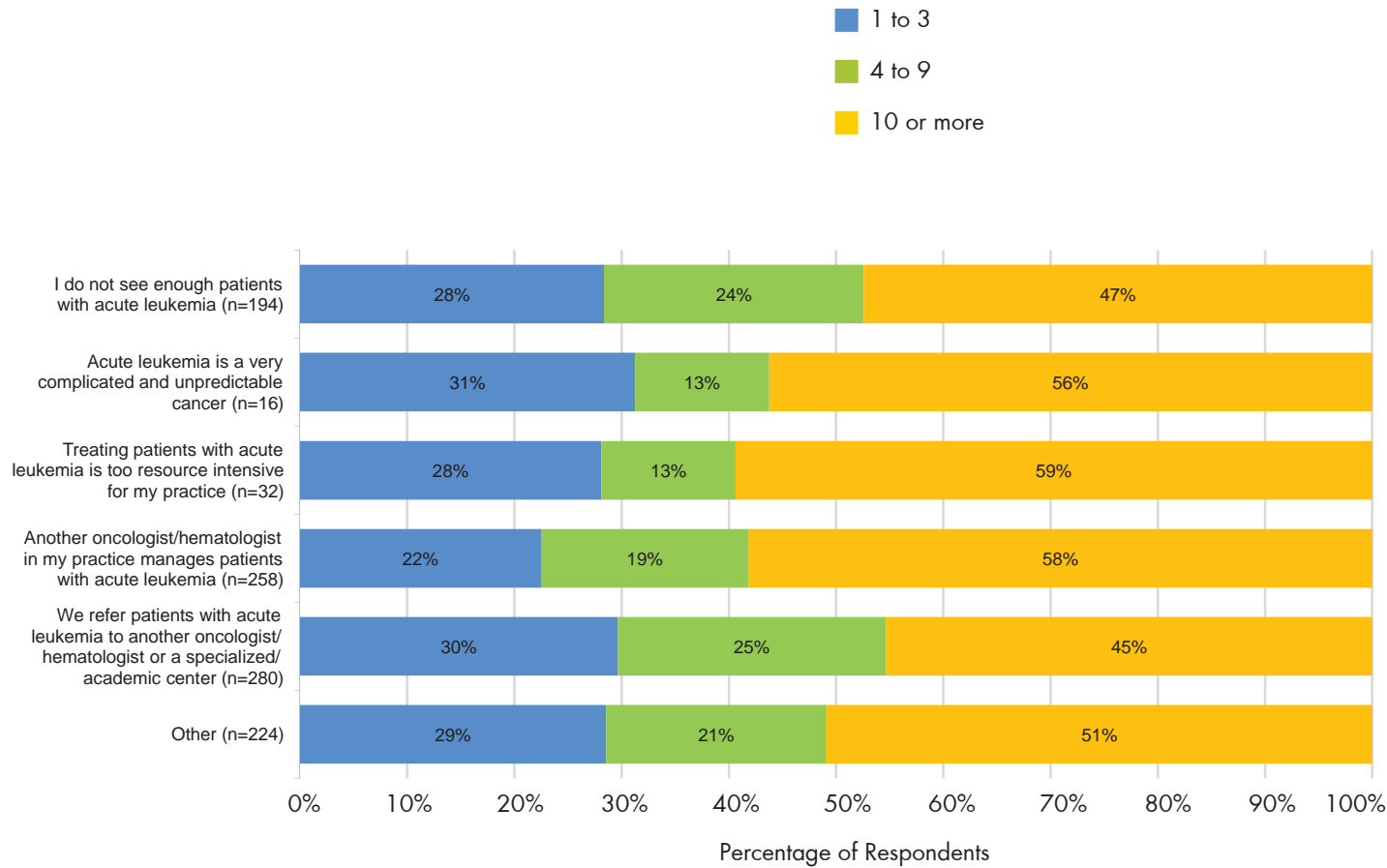

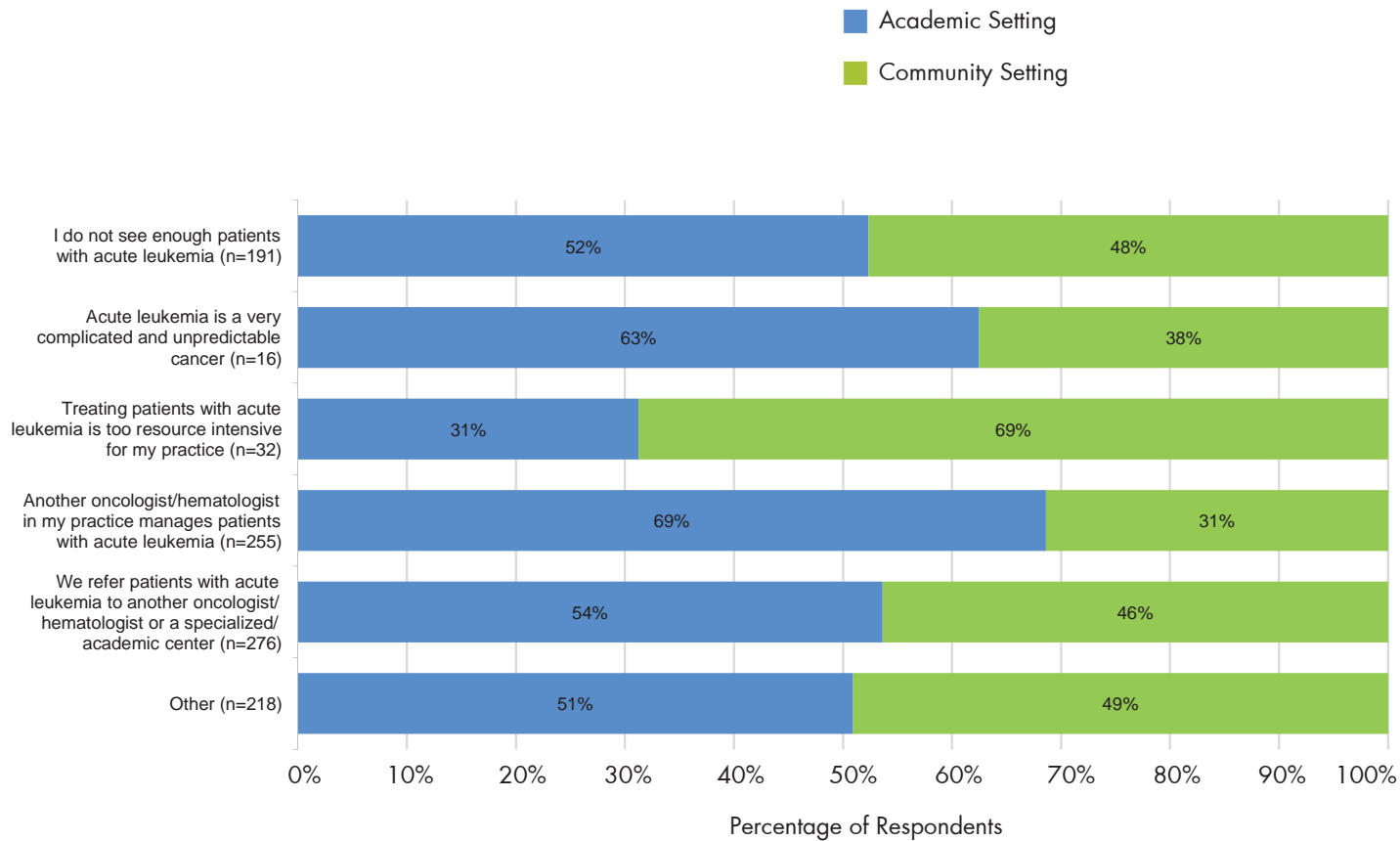
By Practice Size†

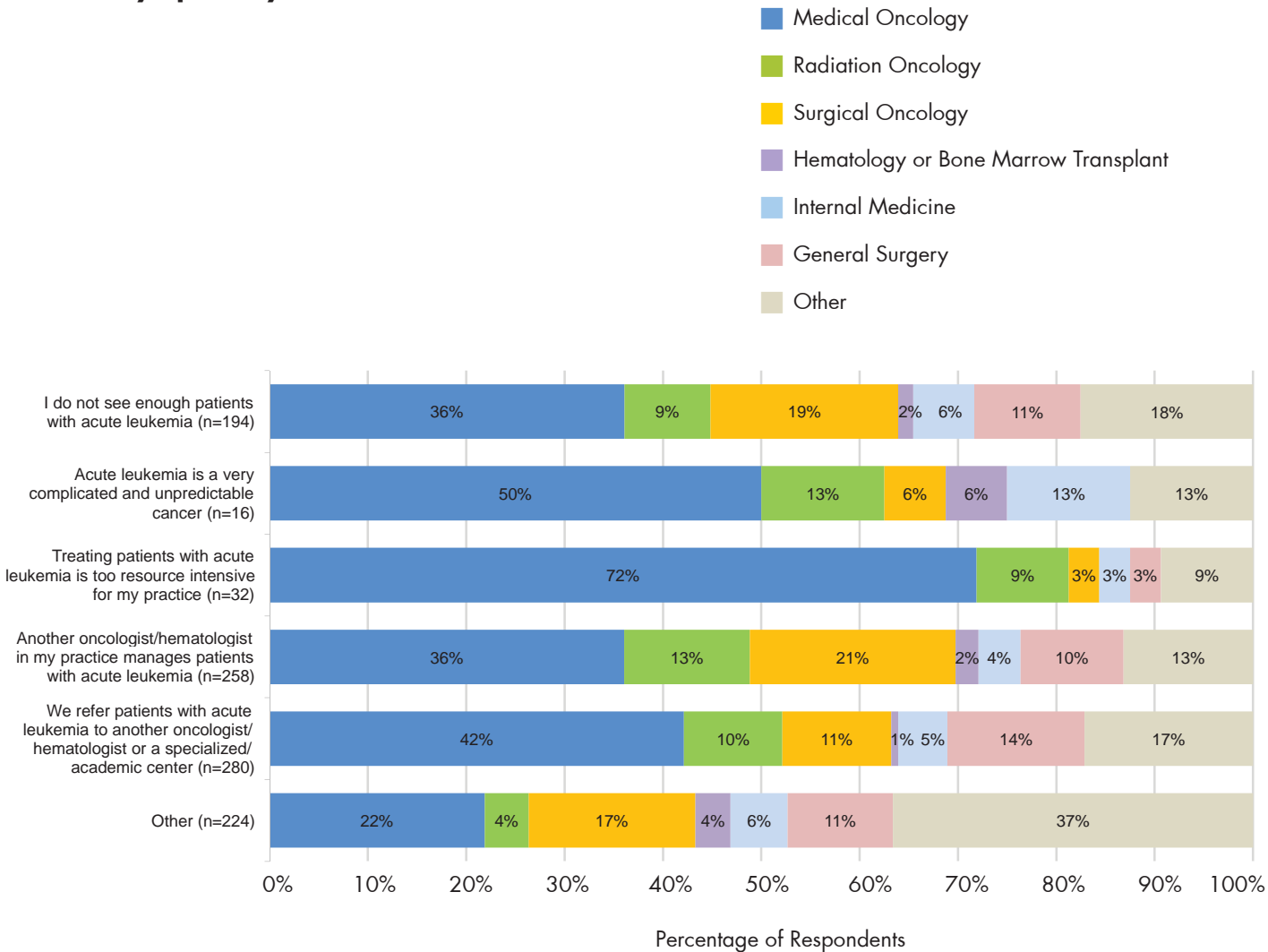

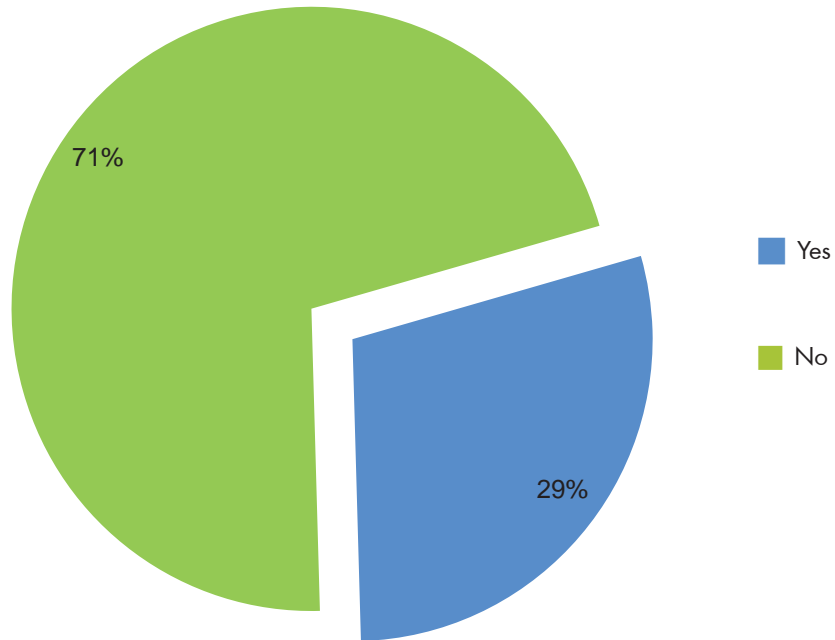

By Specialty†



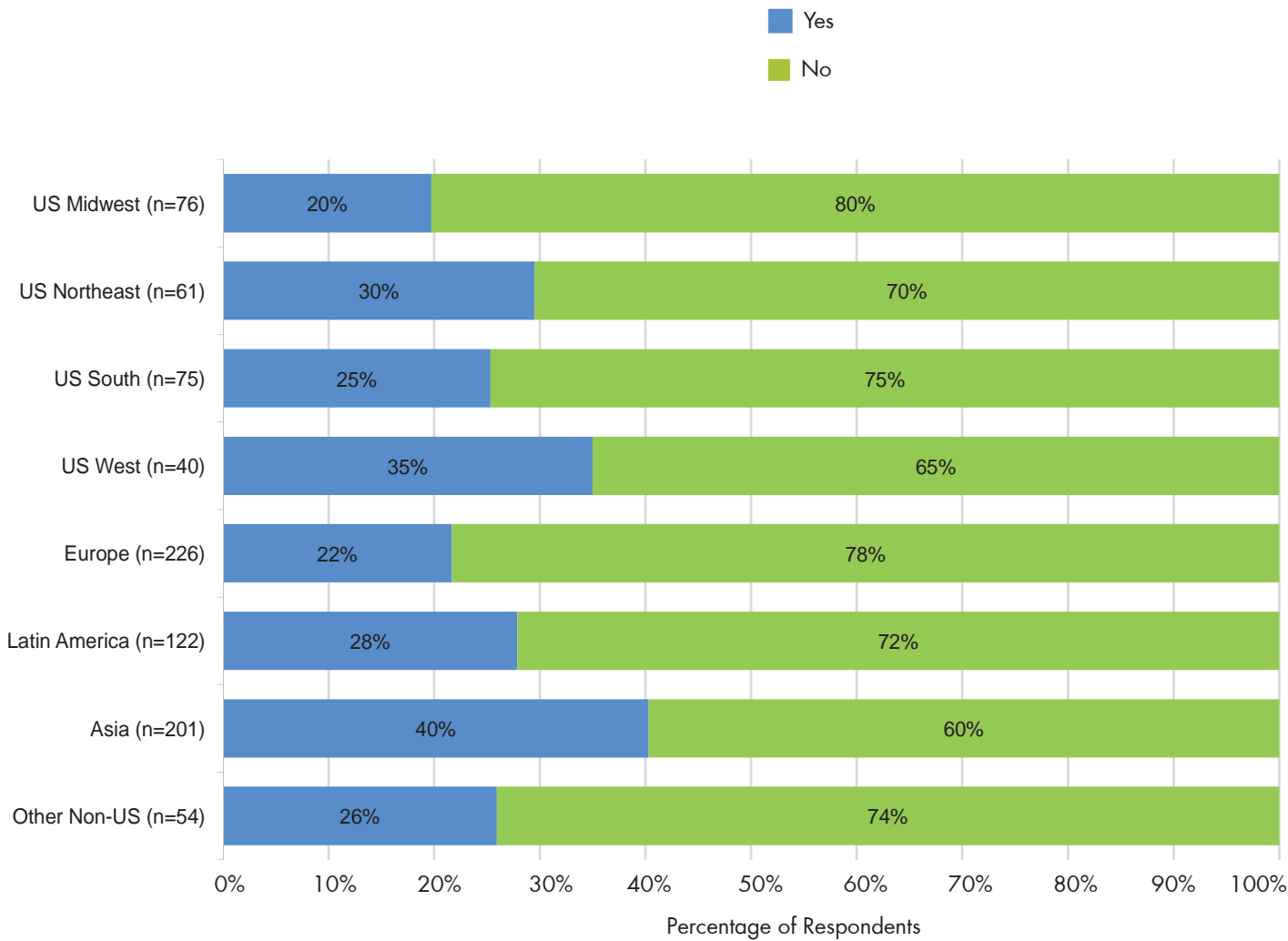

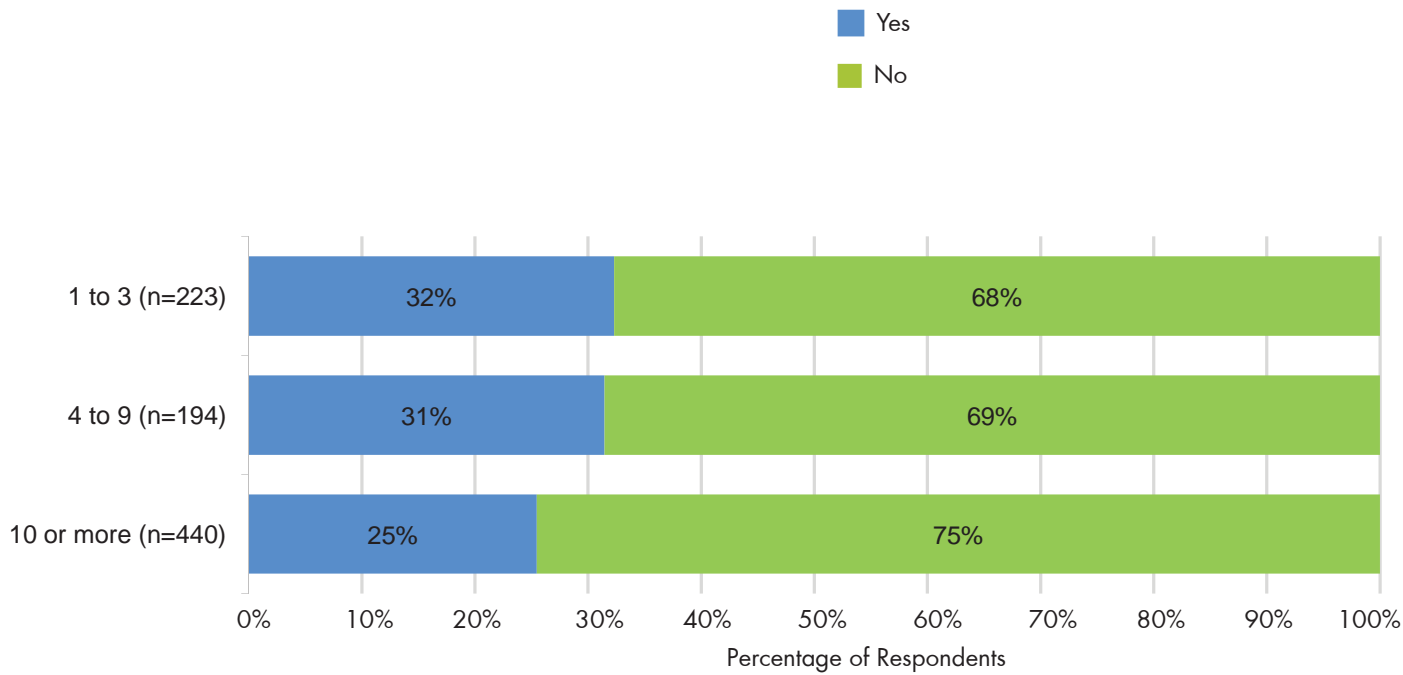

By Geography



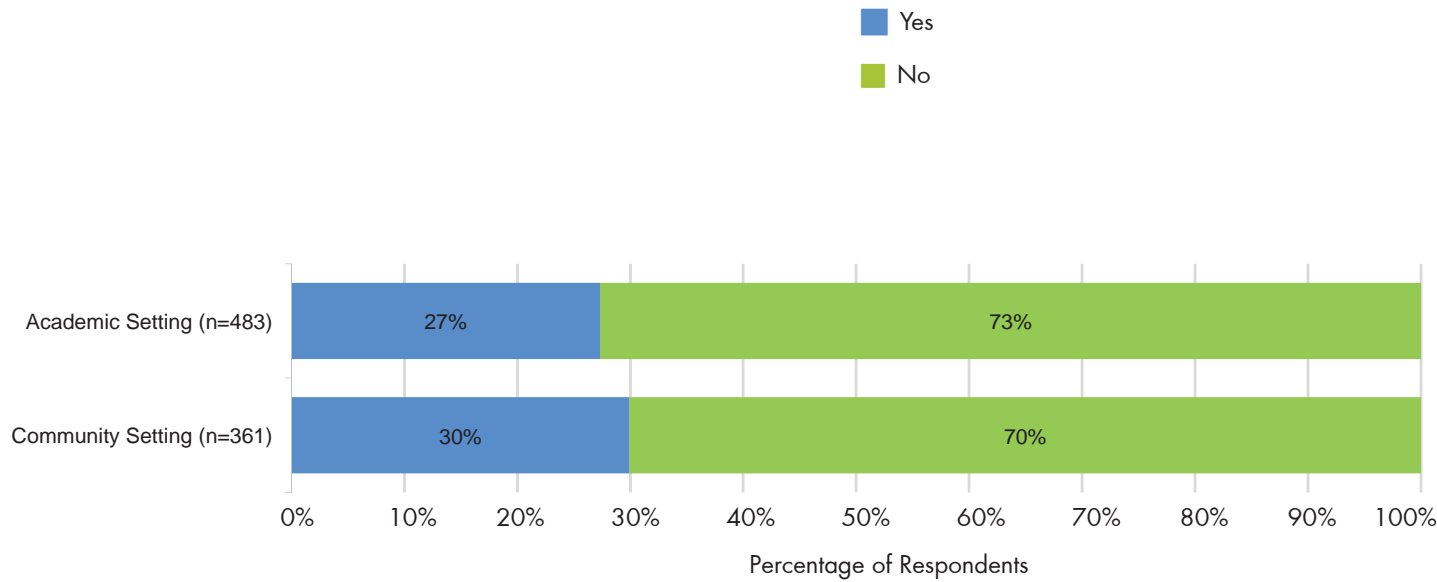

By Practice Size



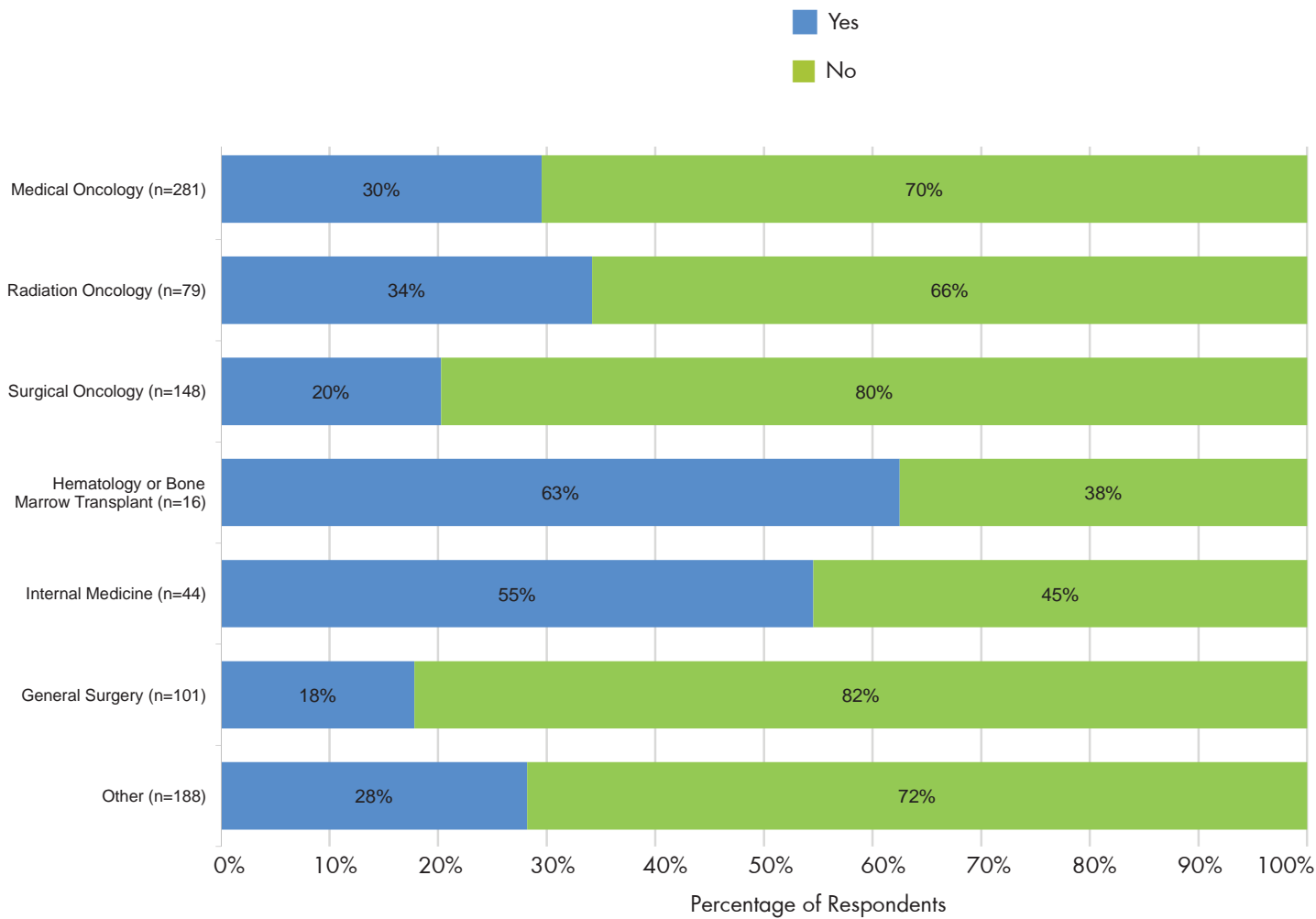
