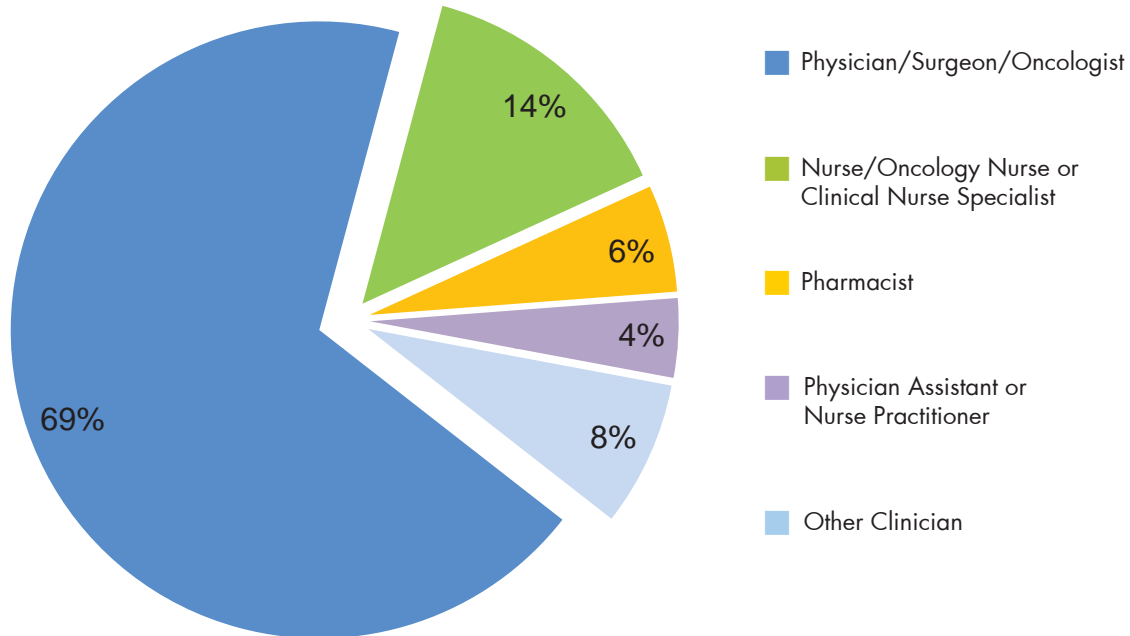

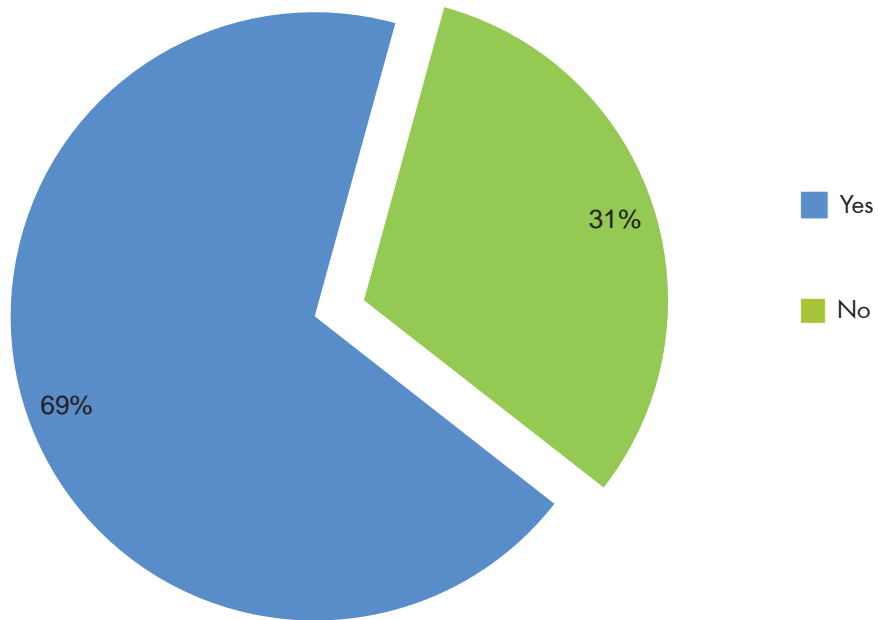

Distribution of Respondent Types (n = 1,616)

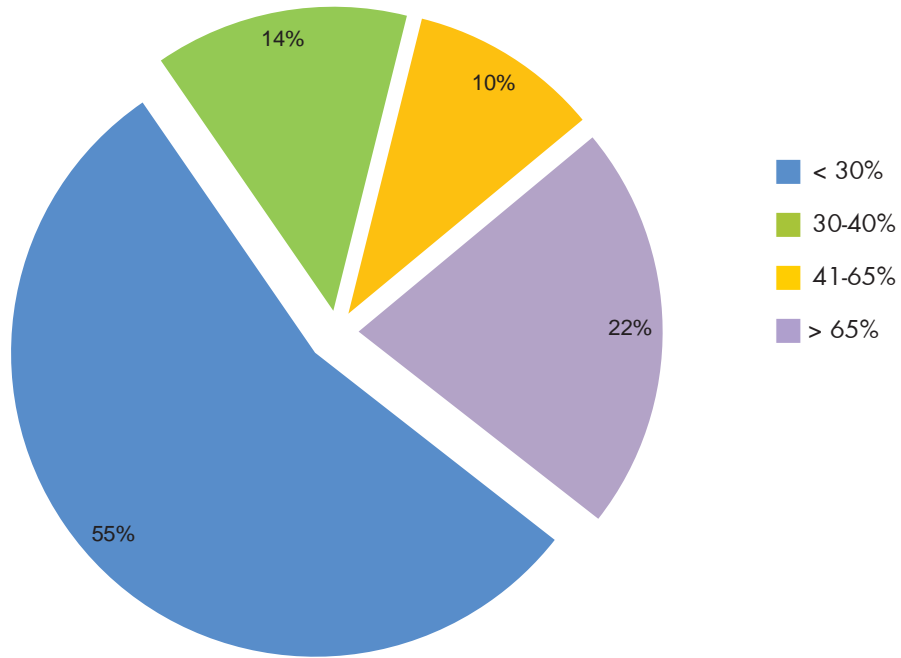

Q1. Do you treat patients with colon cancer? (n = 1,624)



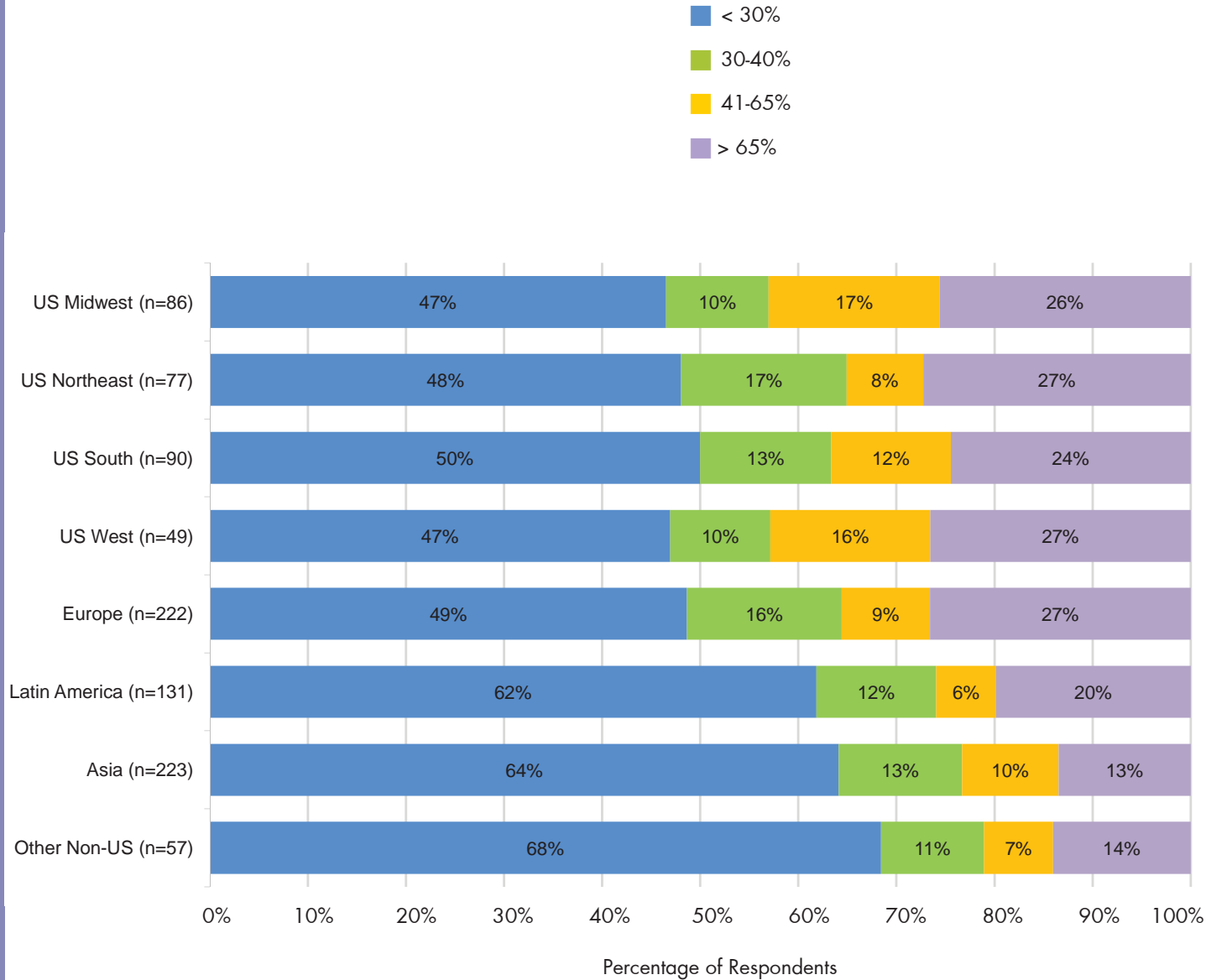

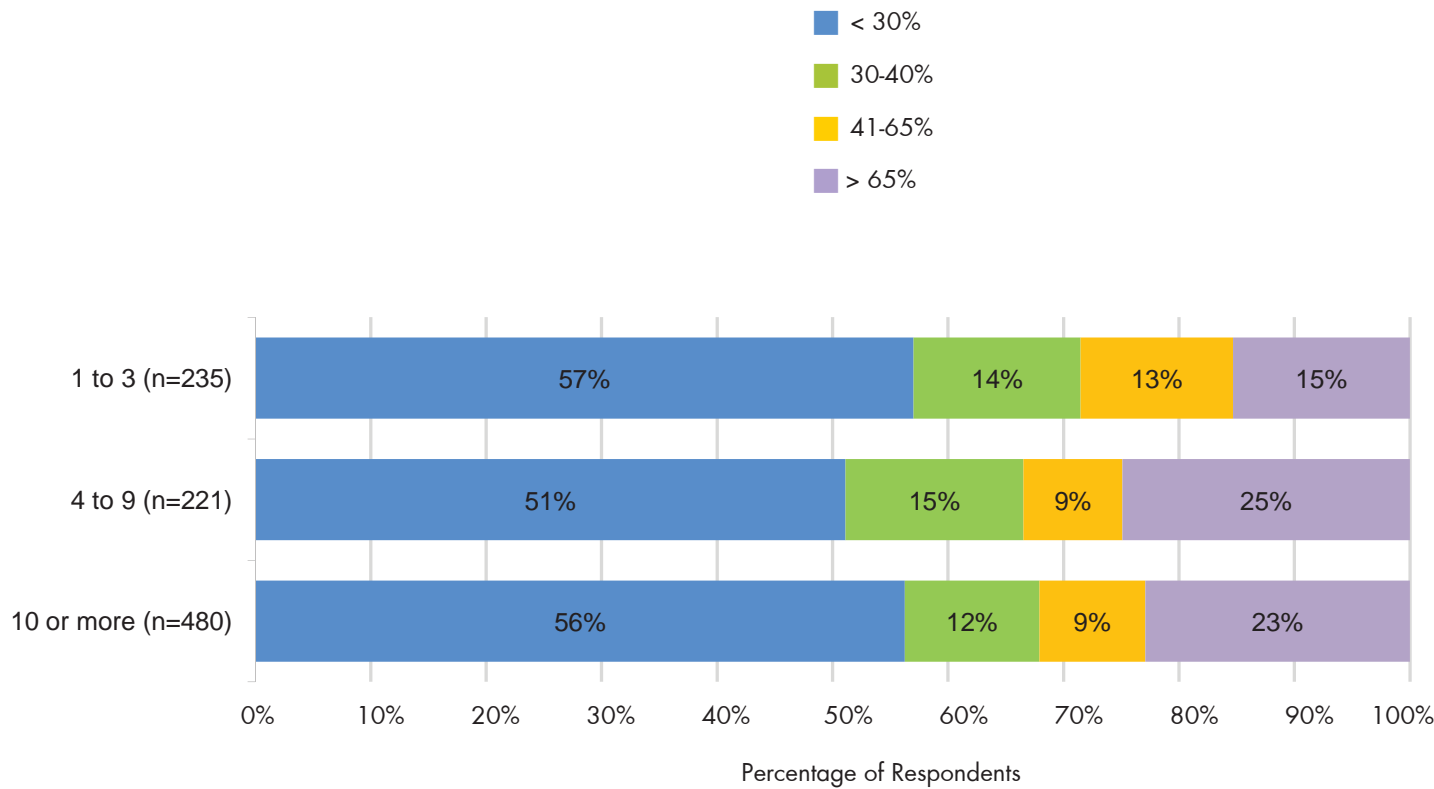
By Geography†

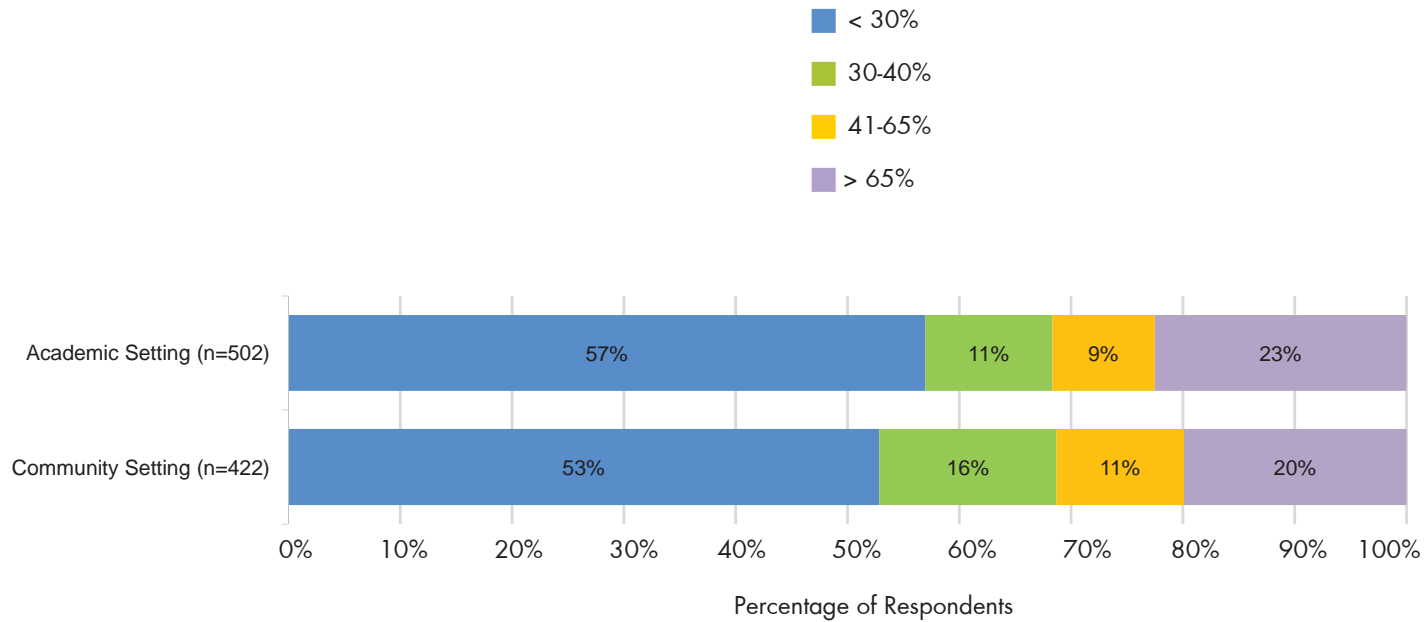
By Practice Size†

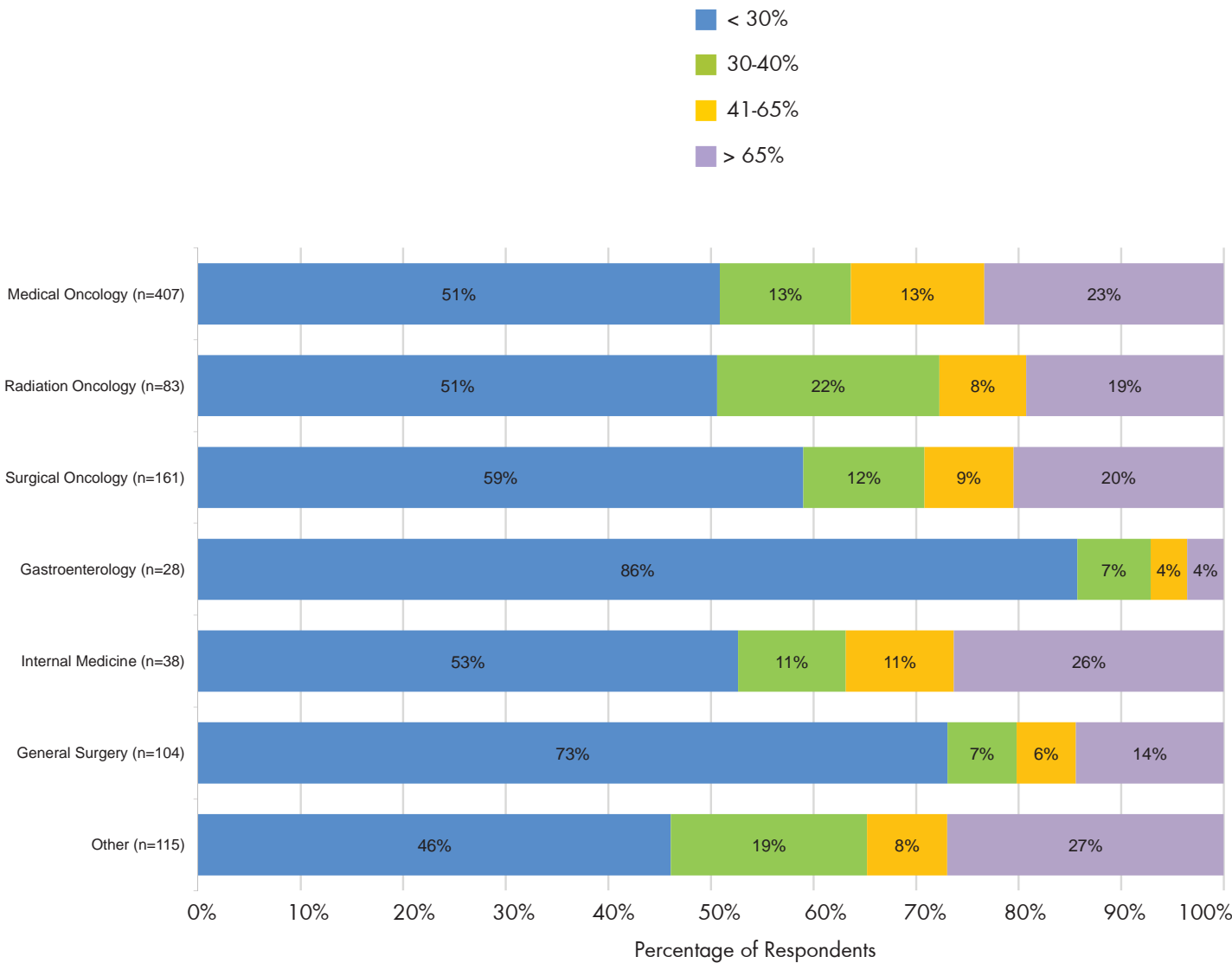

By Practice Setting



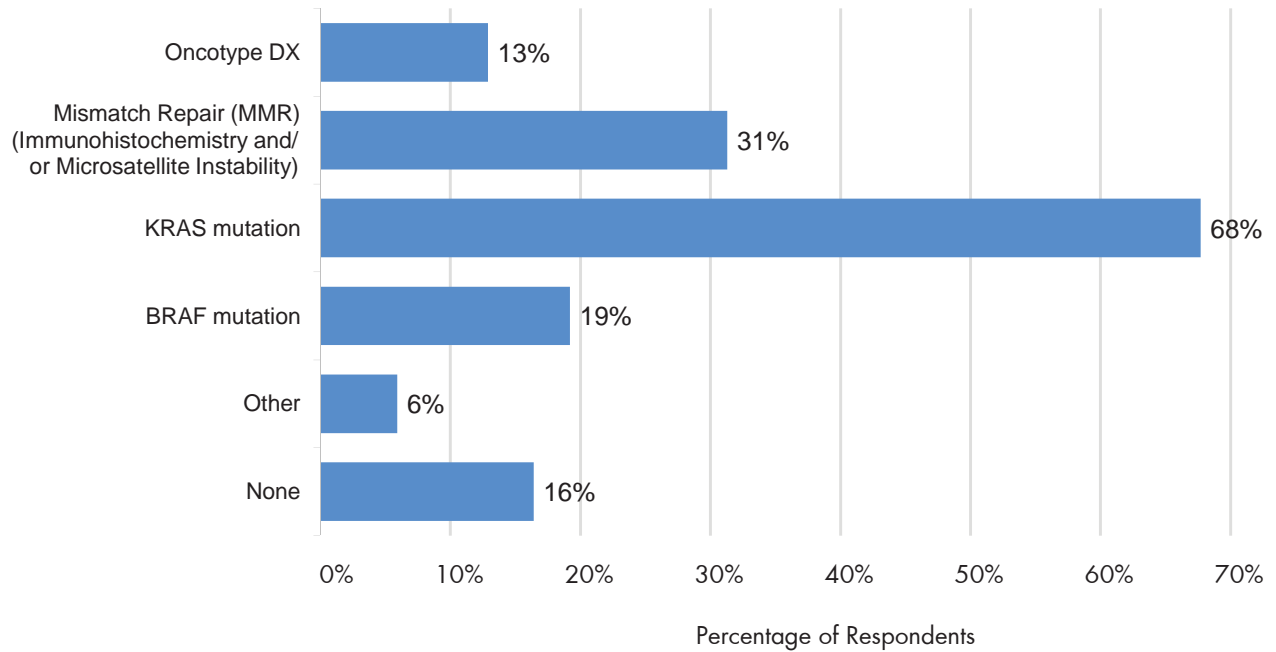

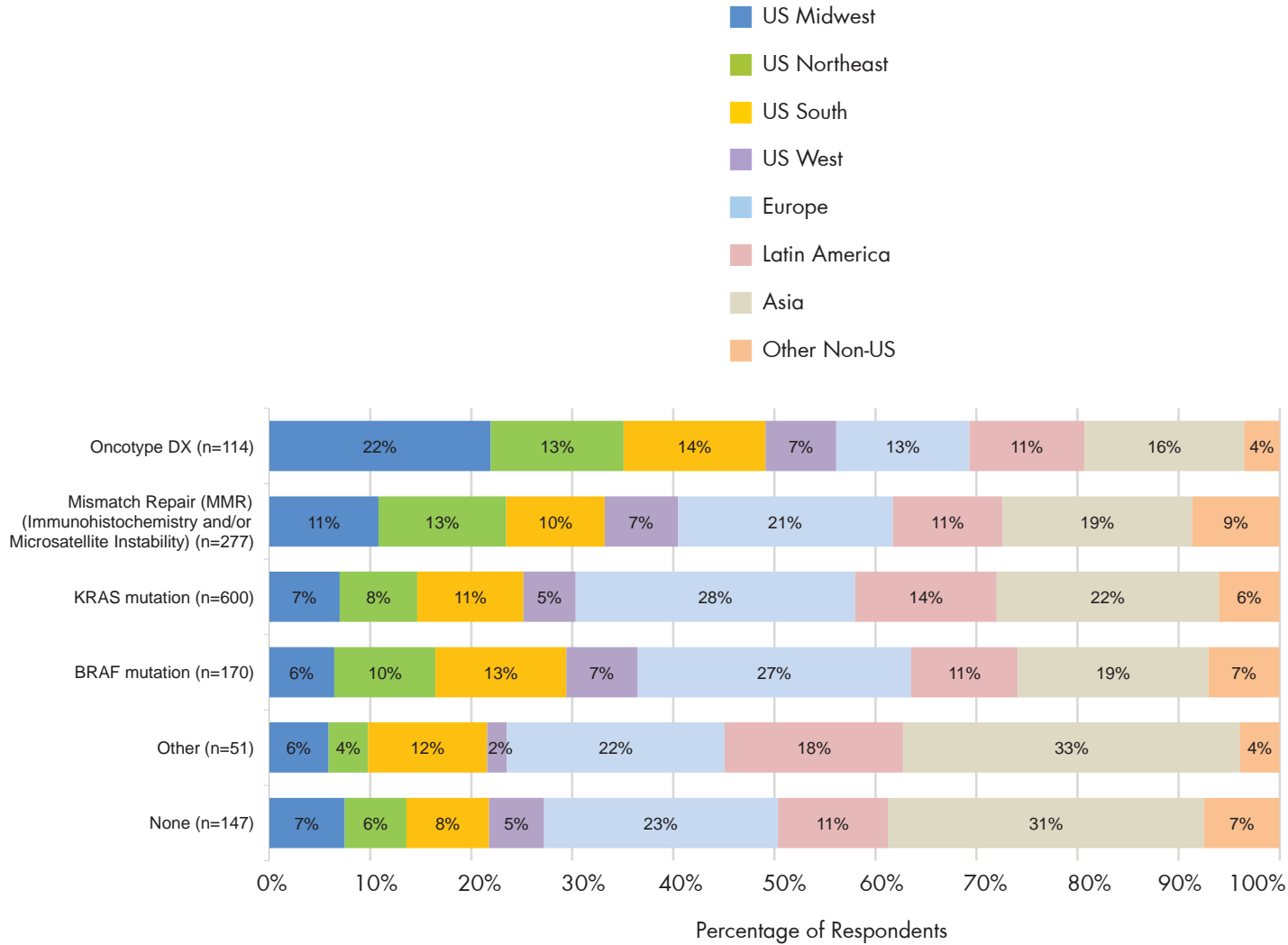

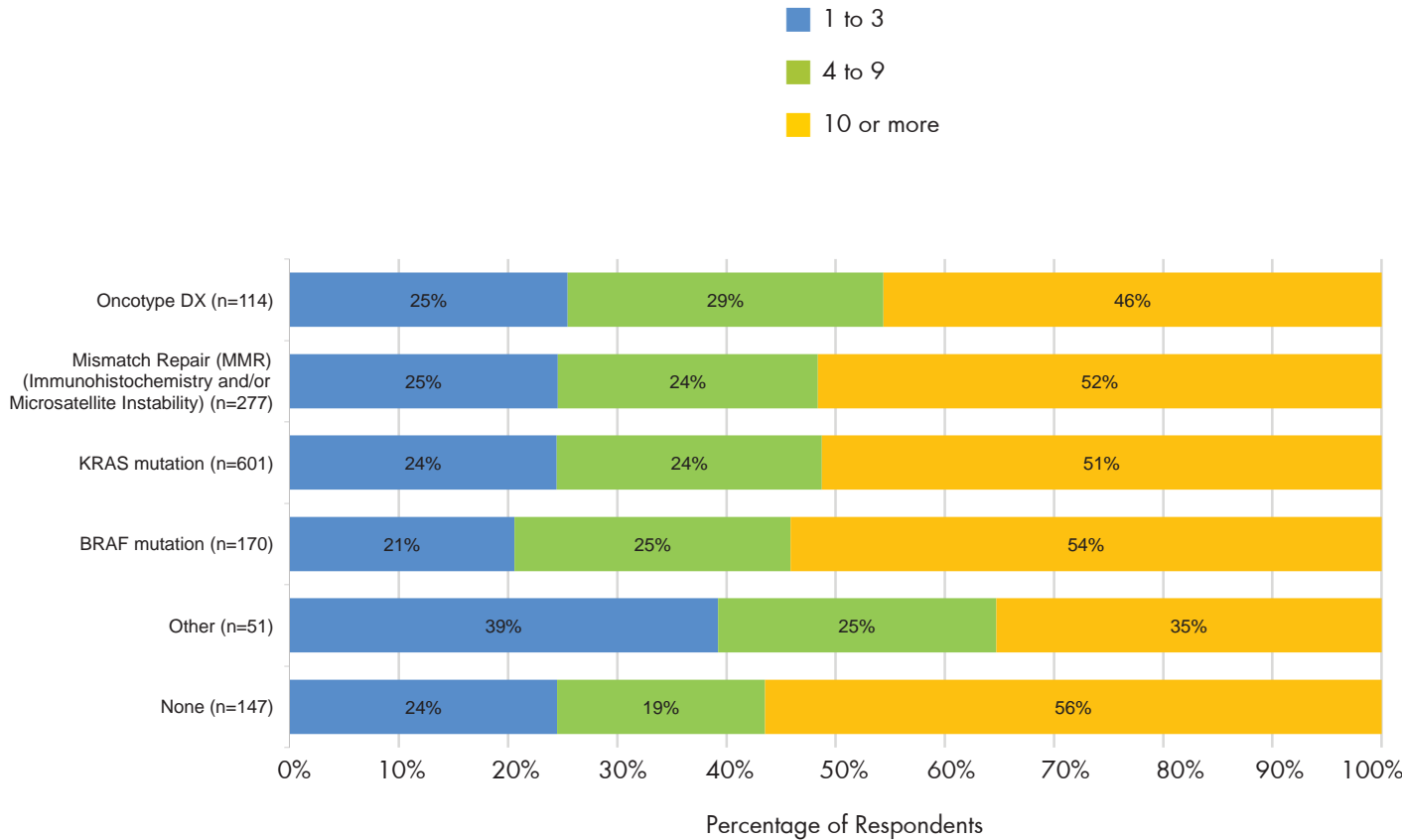
By Geography†

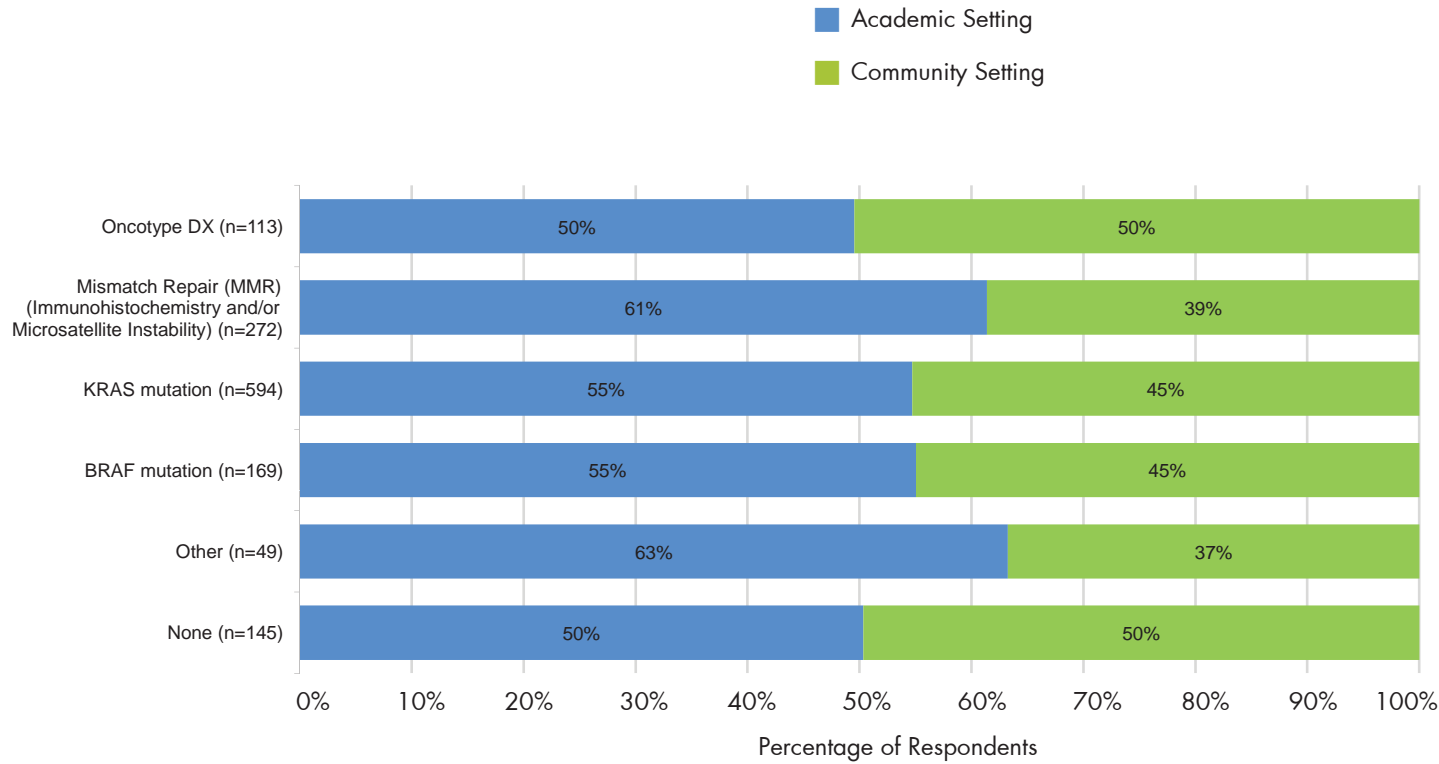
By Practice Size†

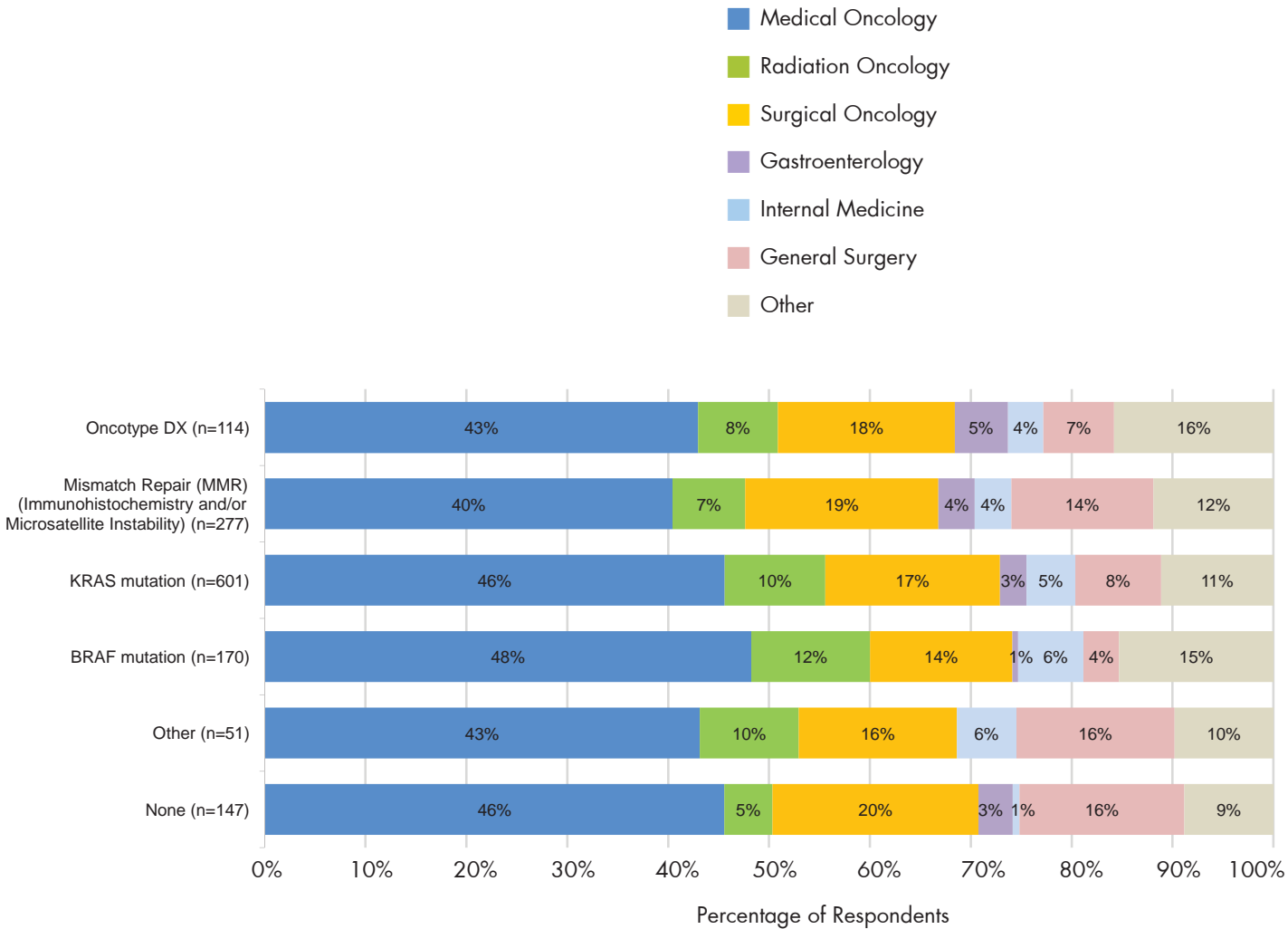
Q3. Which of the following tests, if any, are usually performed for a patient with newly diagnosed, stage III colon cancer? (Select all that apply)
