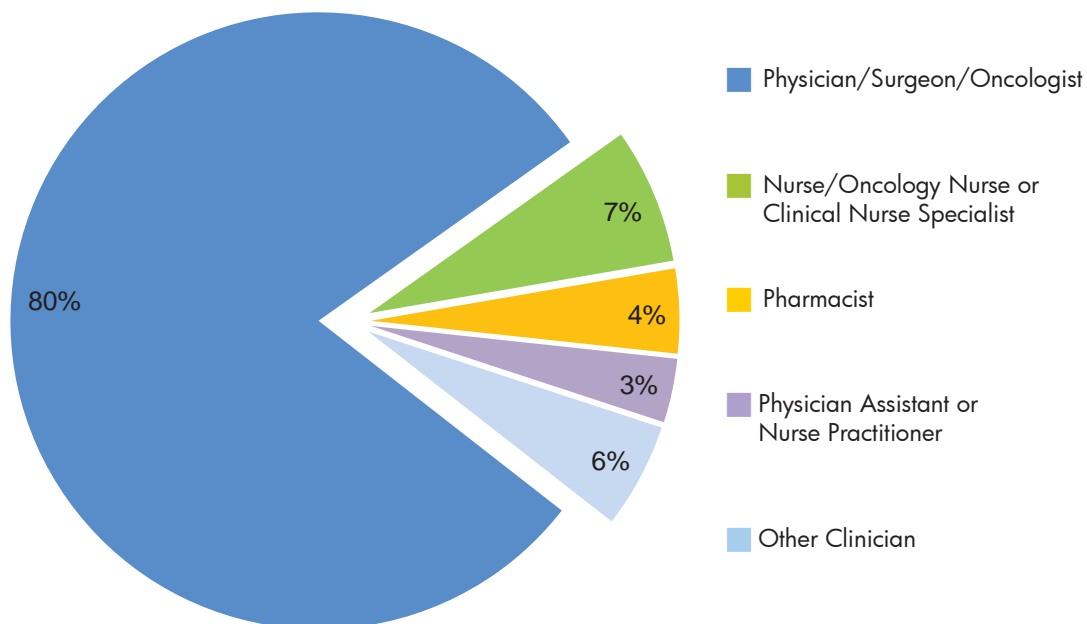


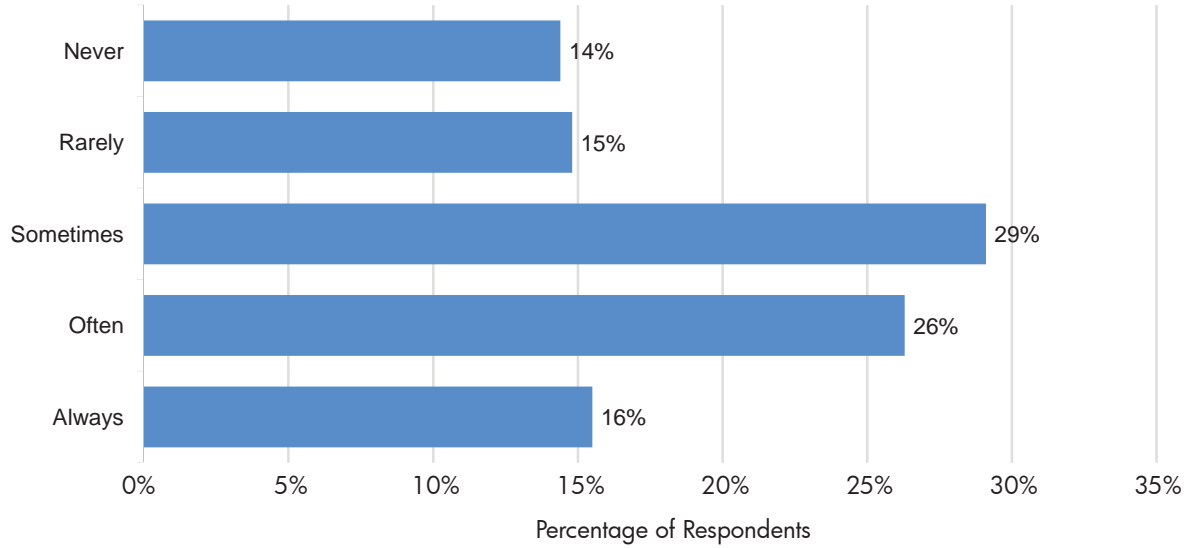

**Distribution of Respondent Types (n = 1,378)**

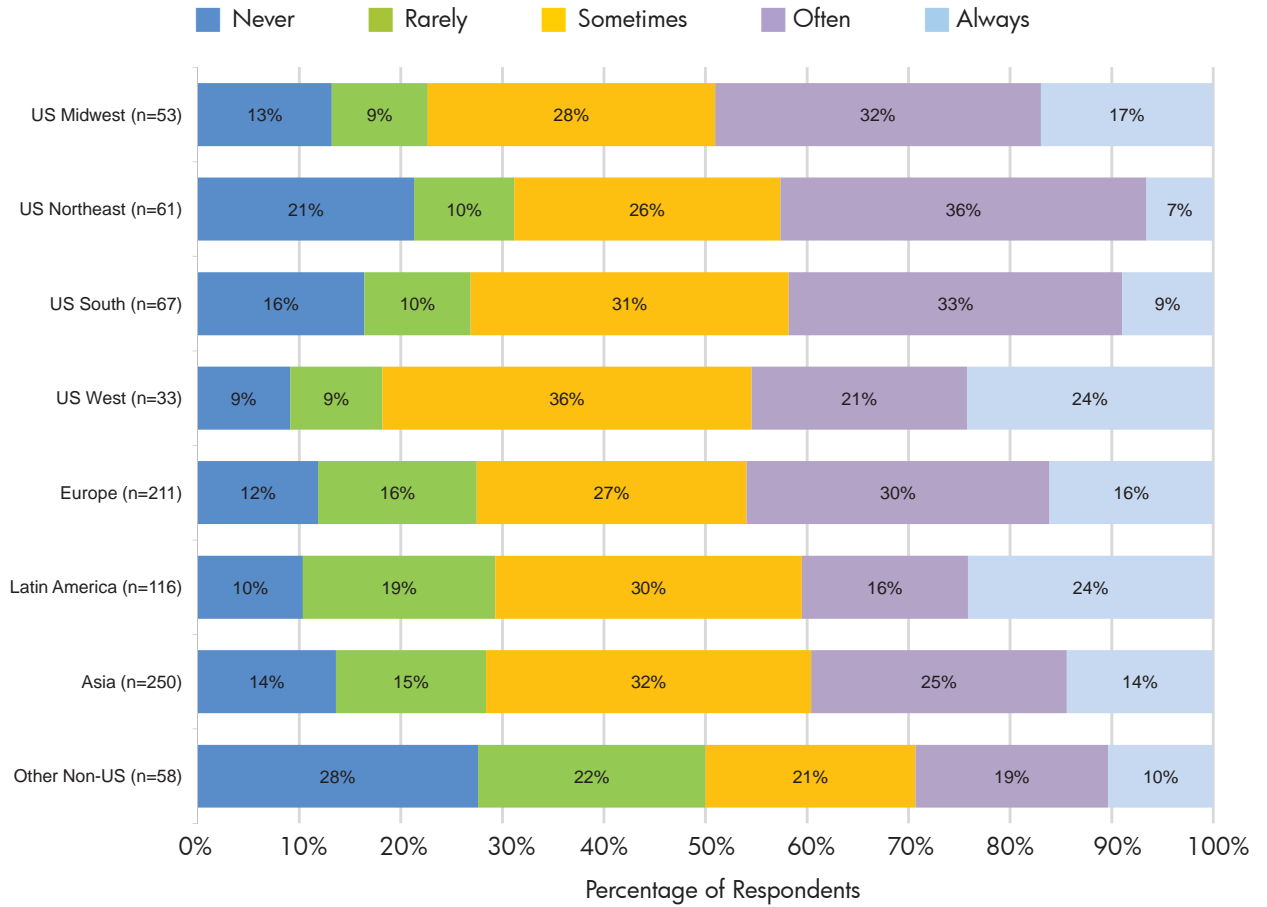


**Q1. How often do you perform companion diagnostic testing when treating your patients with cancer with targeted therapies? (n = 857)**

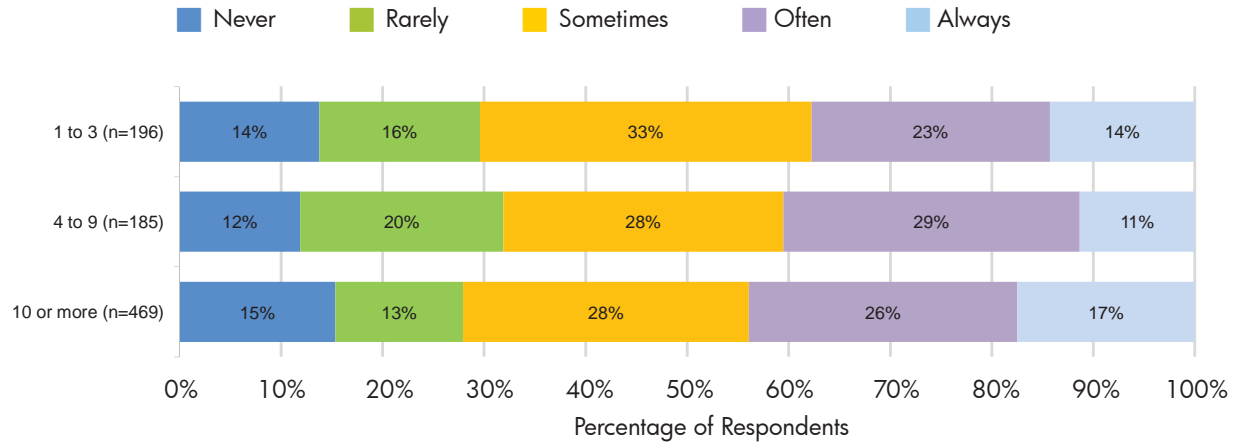

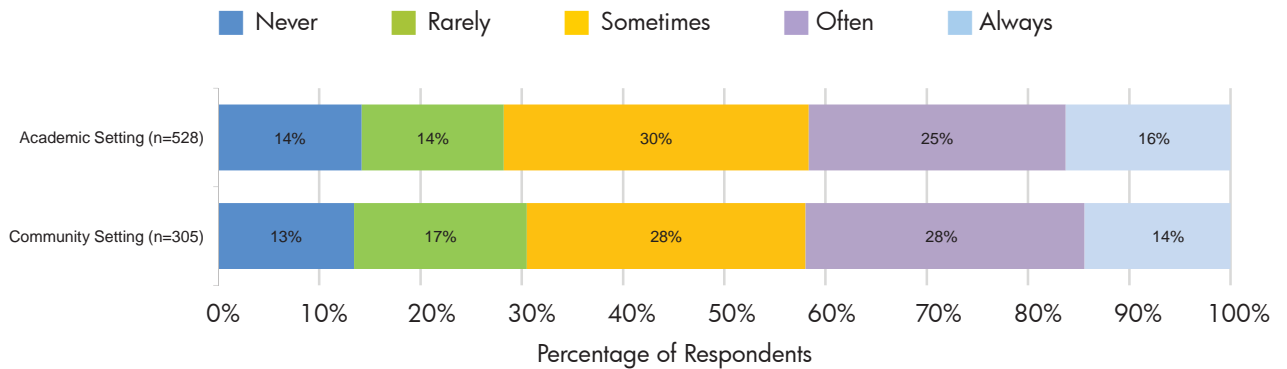

**By Practice Size†**



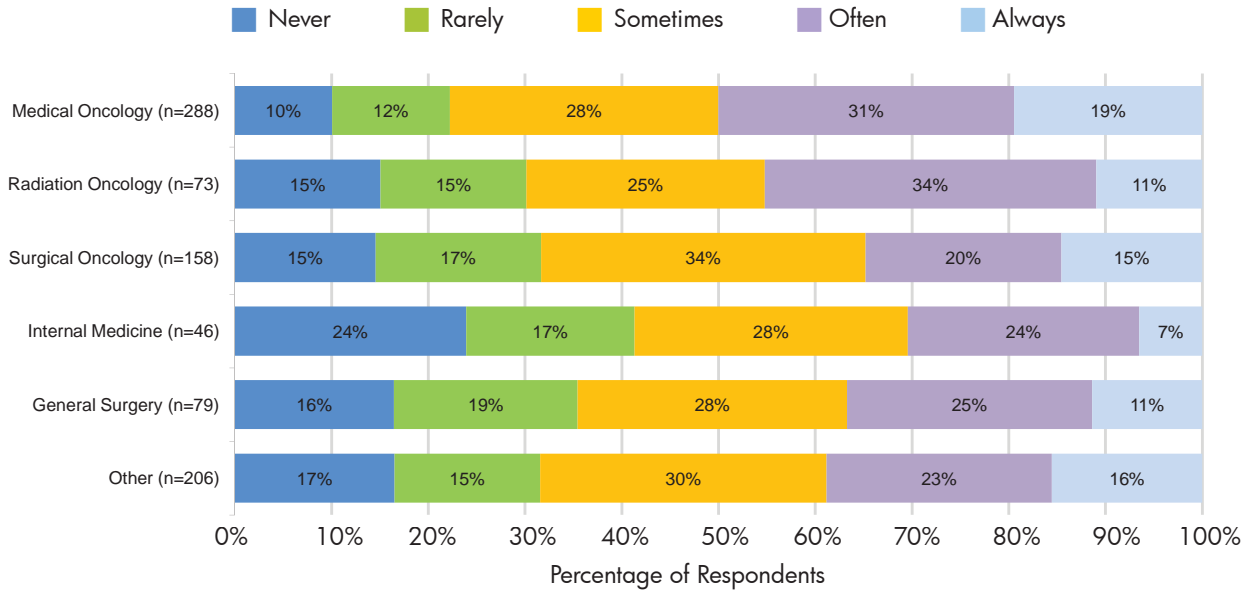

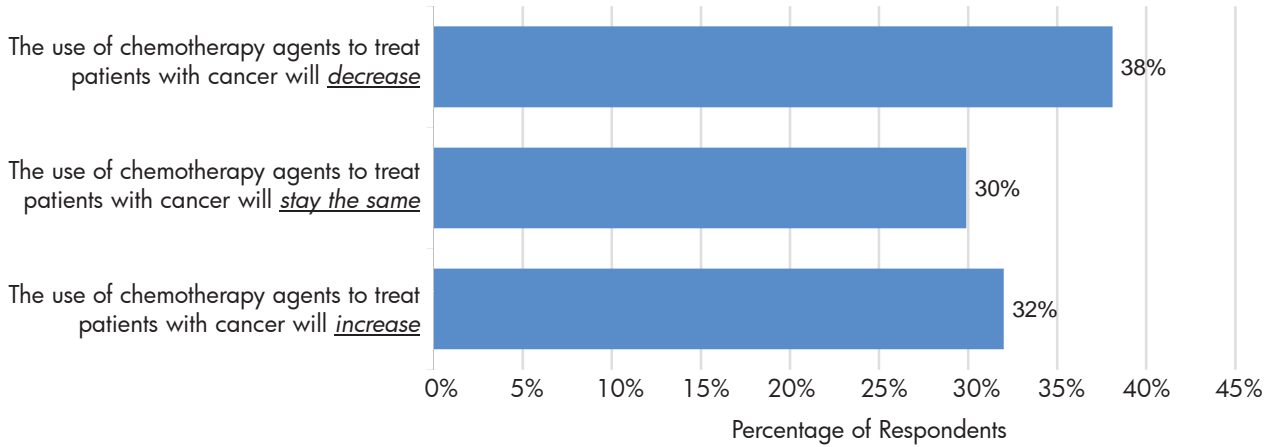
**Q1. How often do you perform companion diagnostic testing when treating your patients with cancer with targeted therapies?**

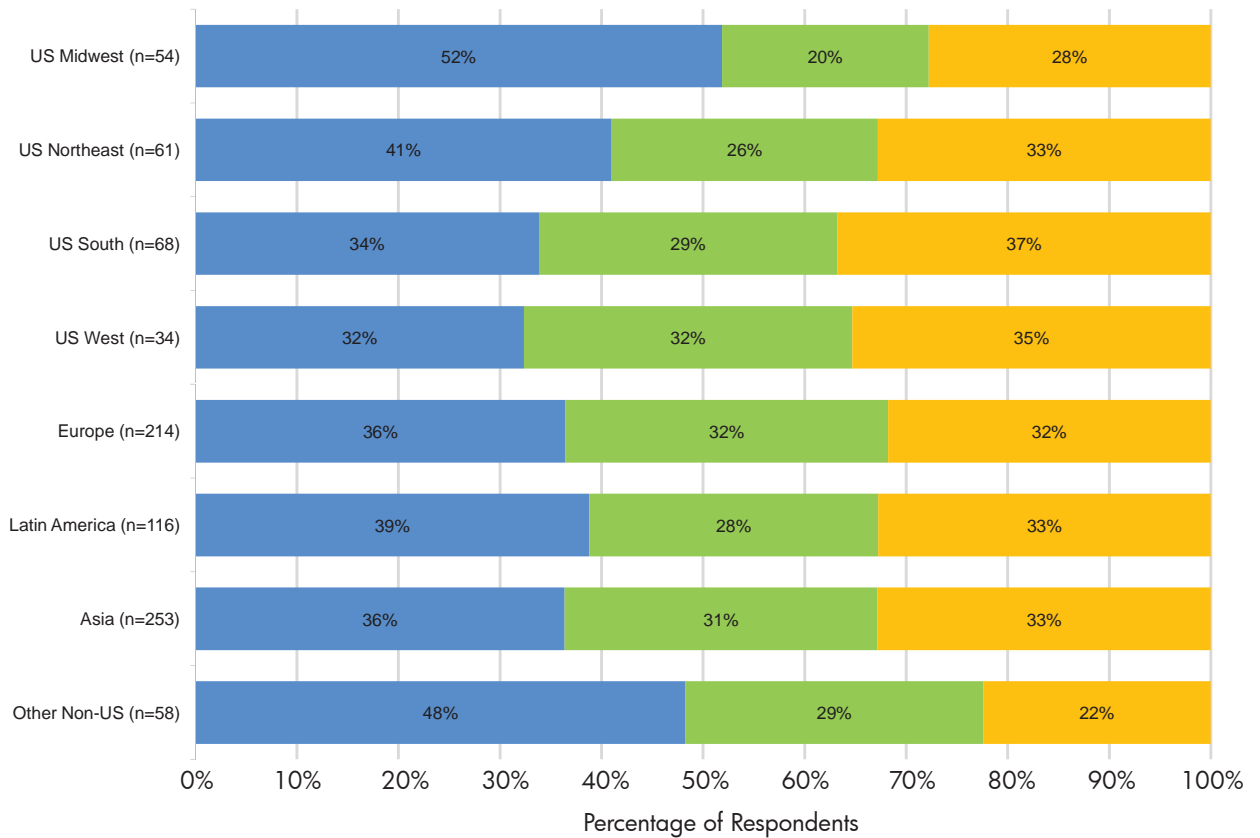

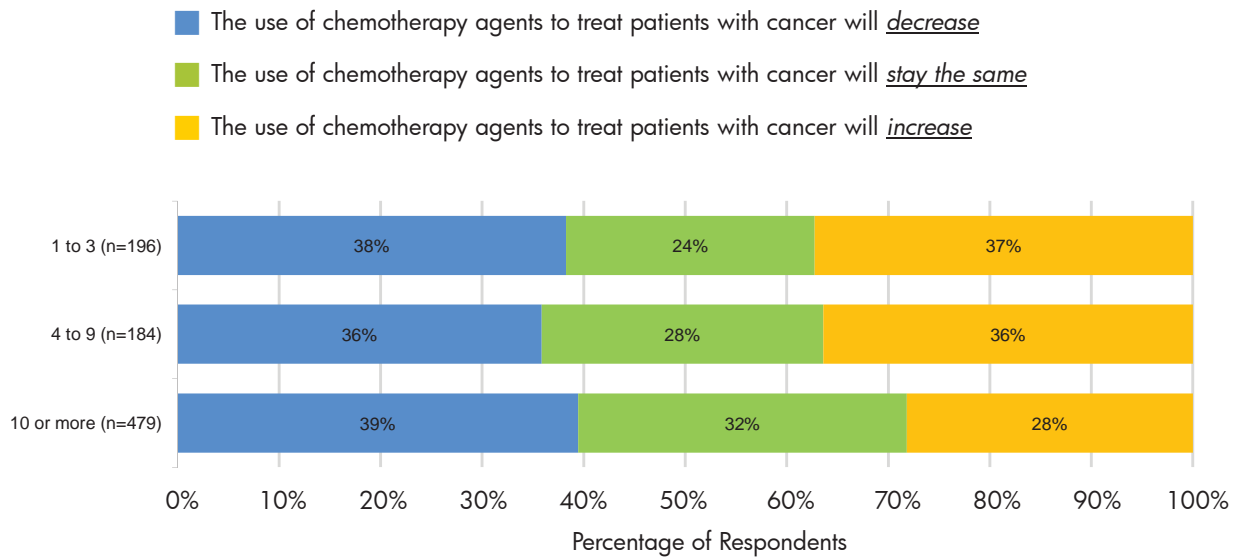

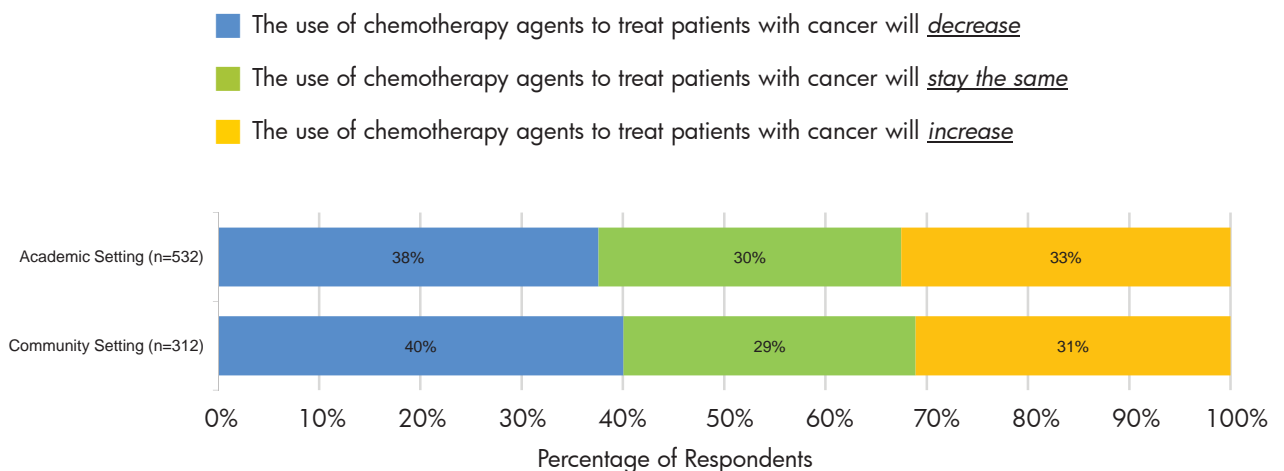

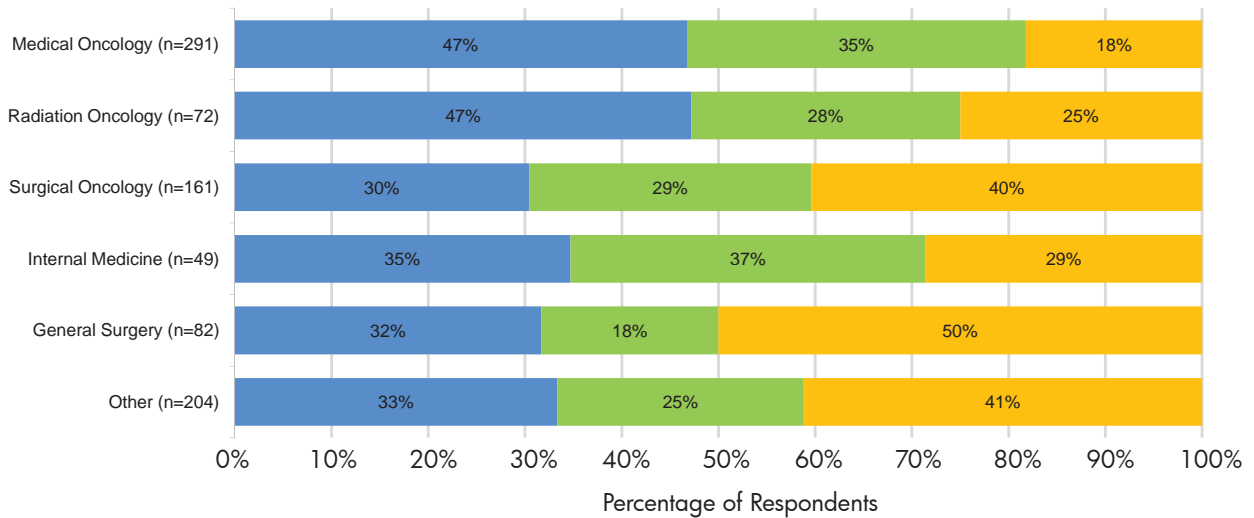
