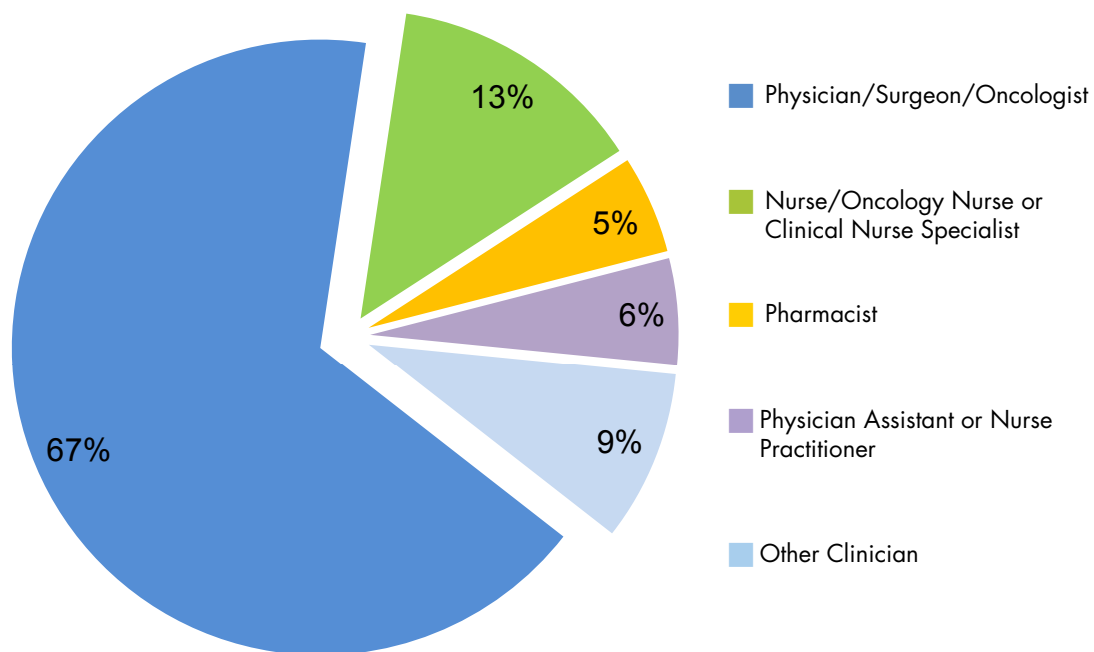

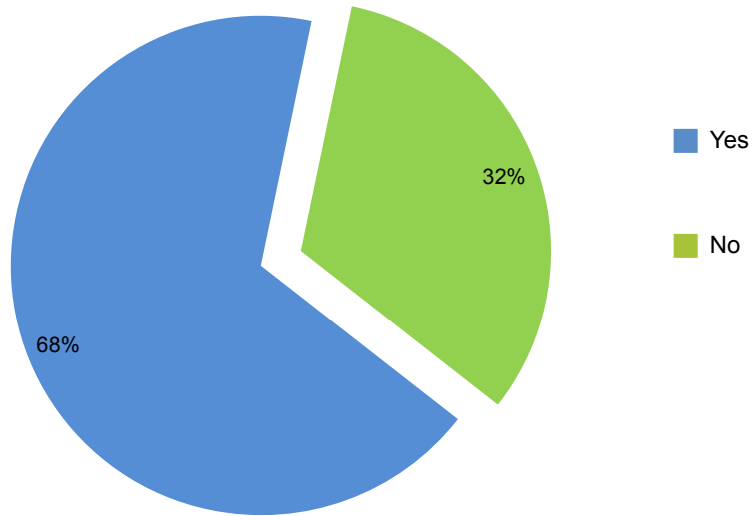
**Distribution of Respondent Types (n = 1,380)**

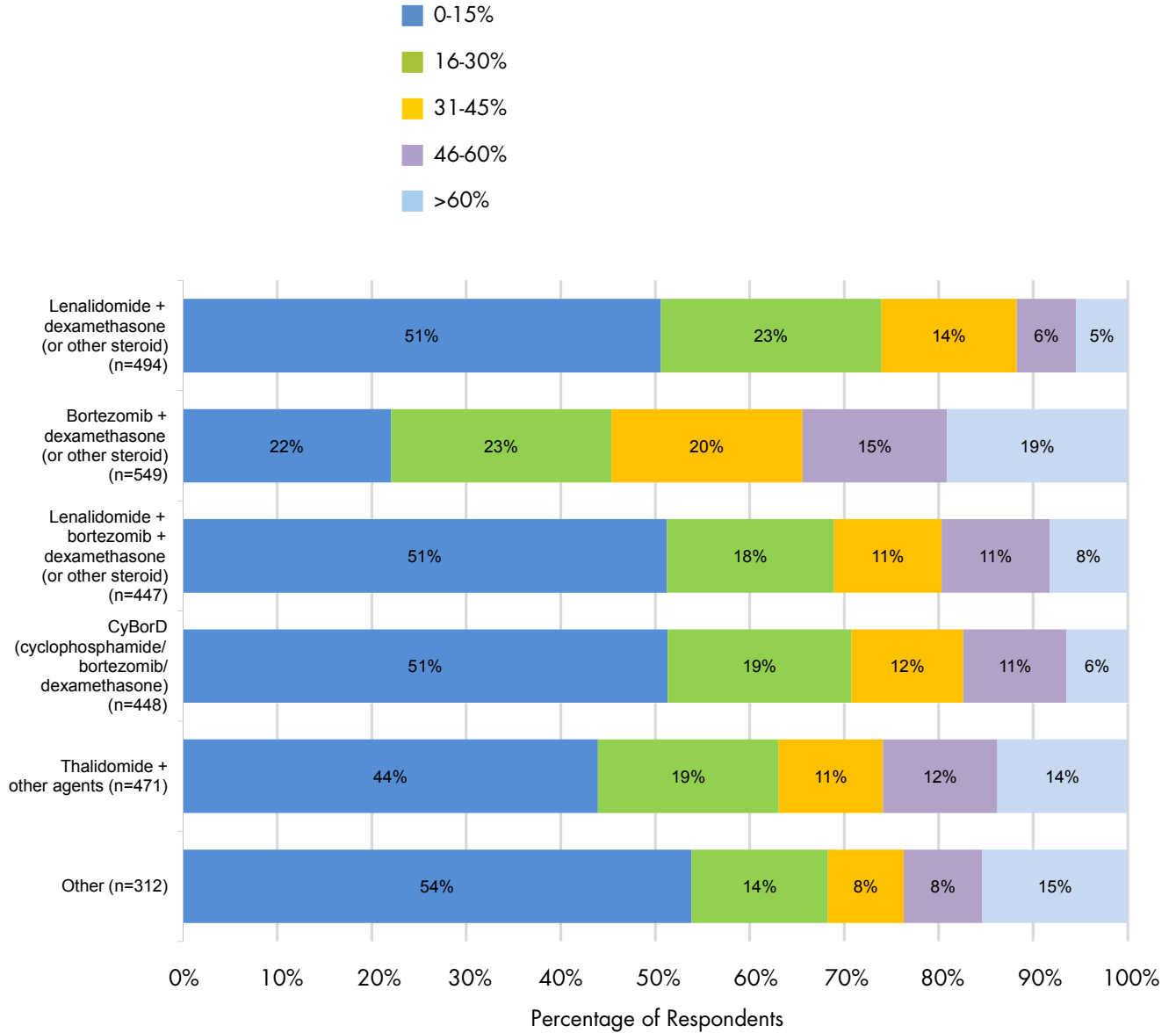
**Q1. Do you treat patients with multiple myeloma? (n = 1,385)**

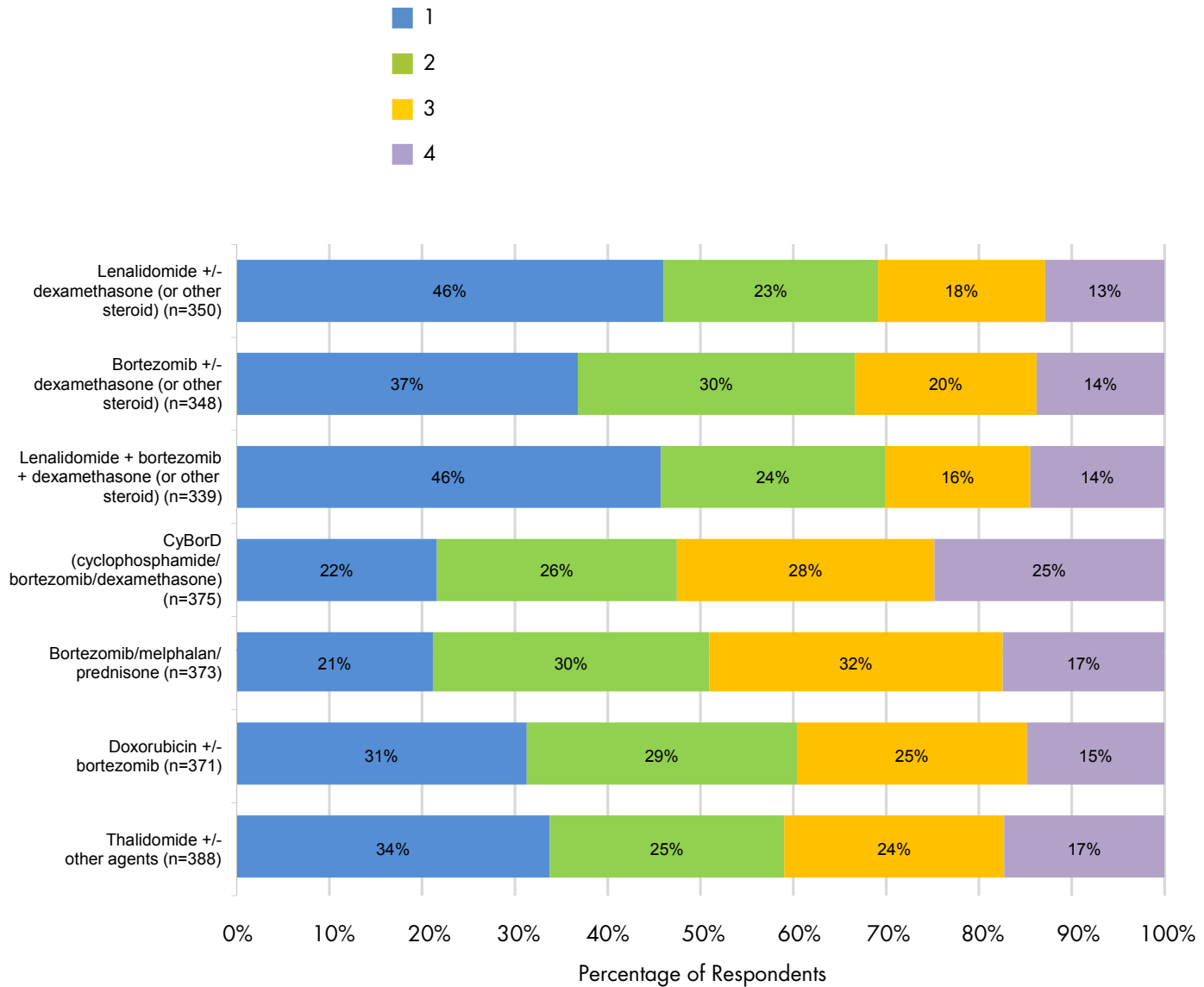

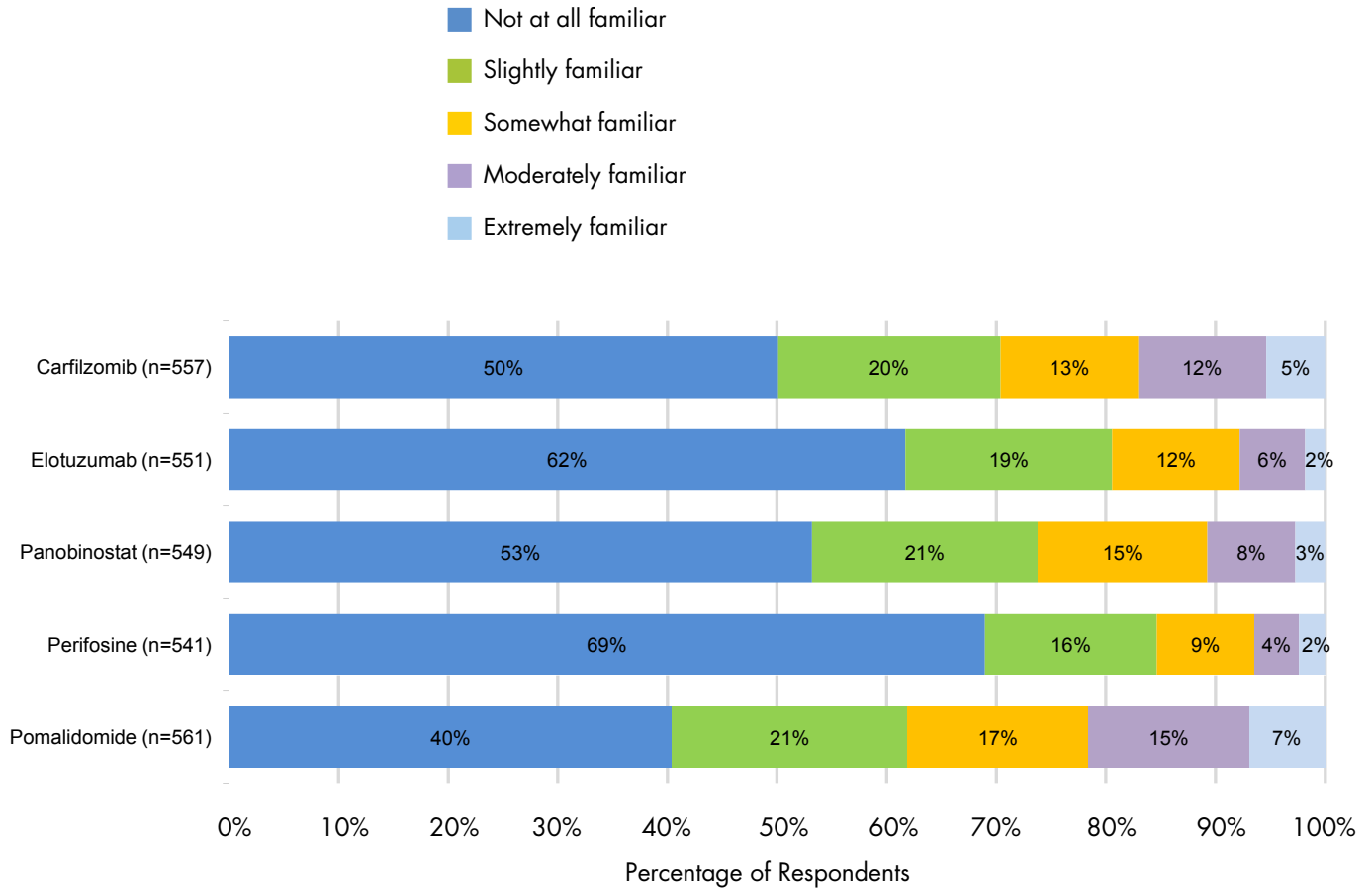

**Q4. Please rate your level of familiarity with the following investigational agents for the treatment of multiple myeloma?†**

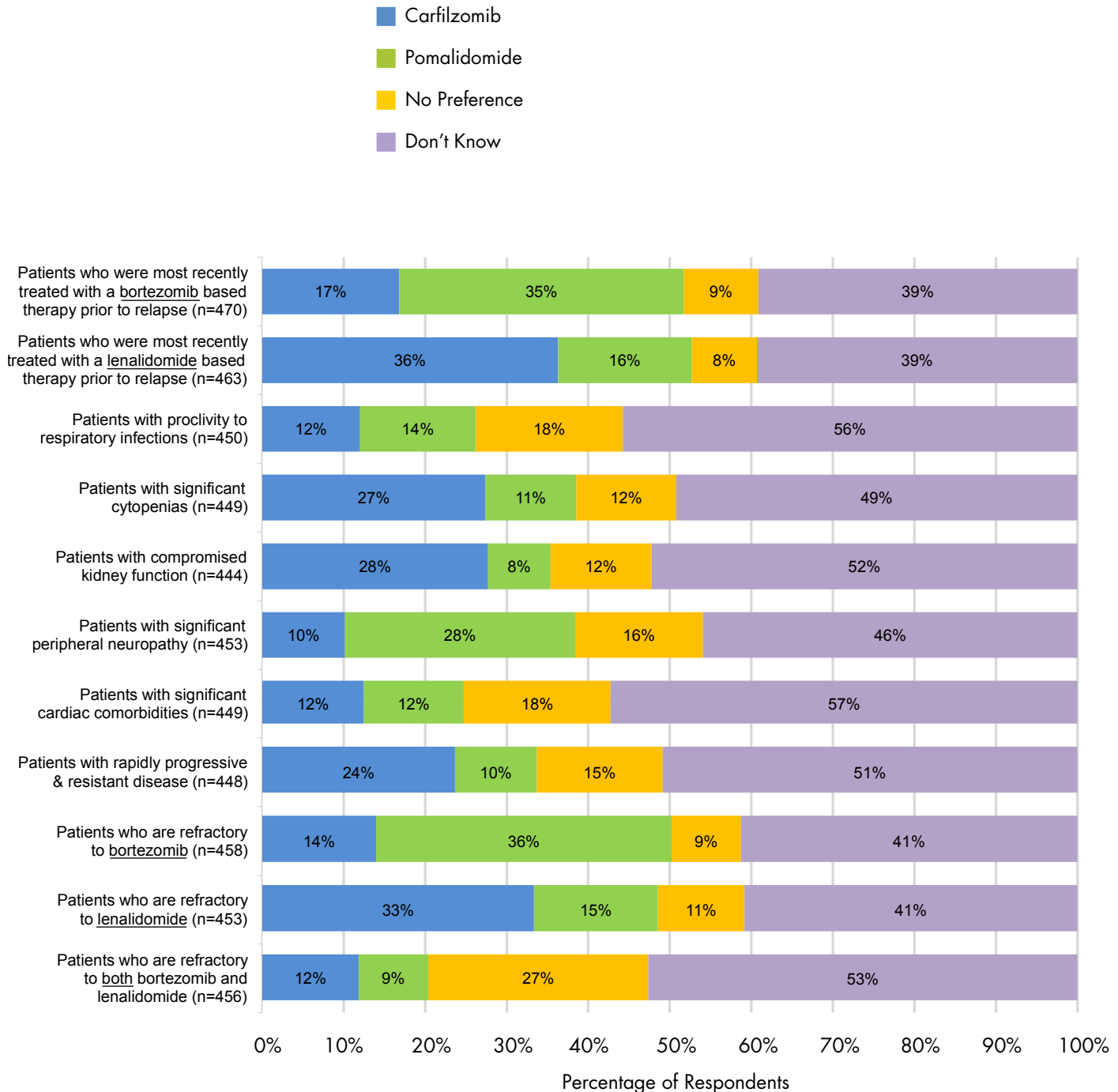
