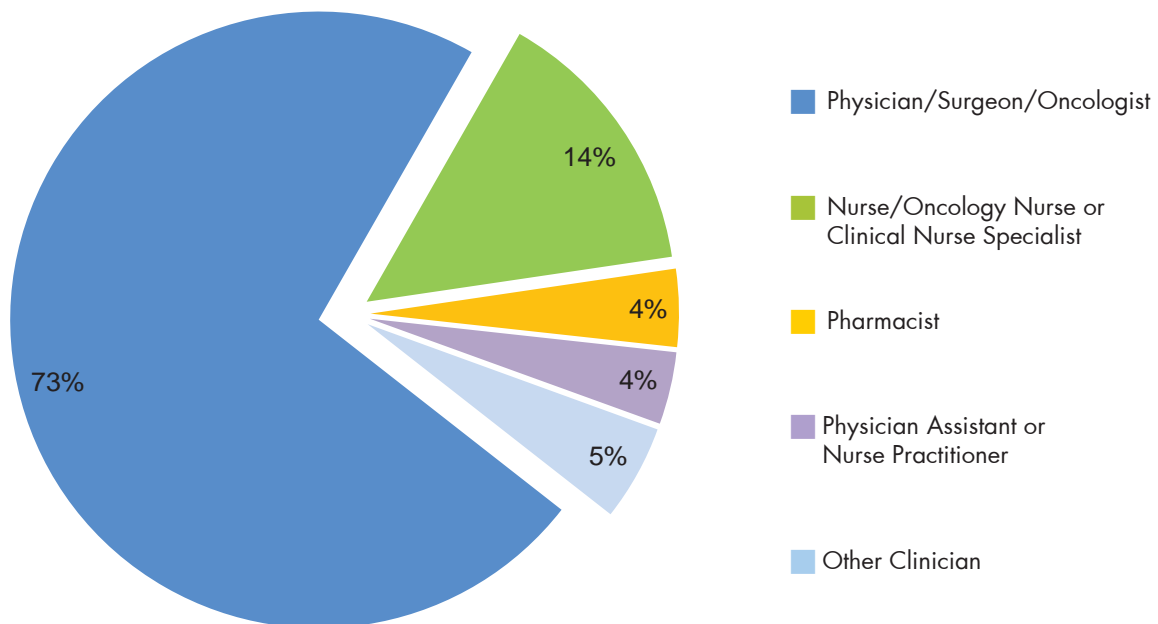


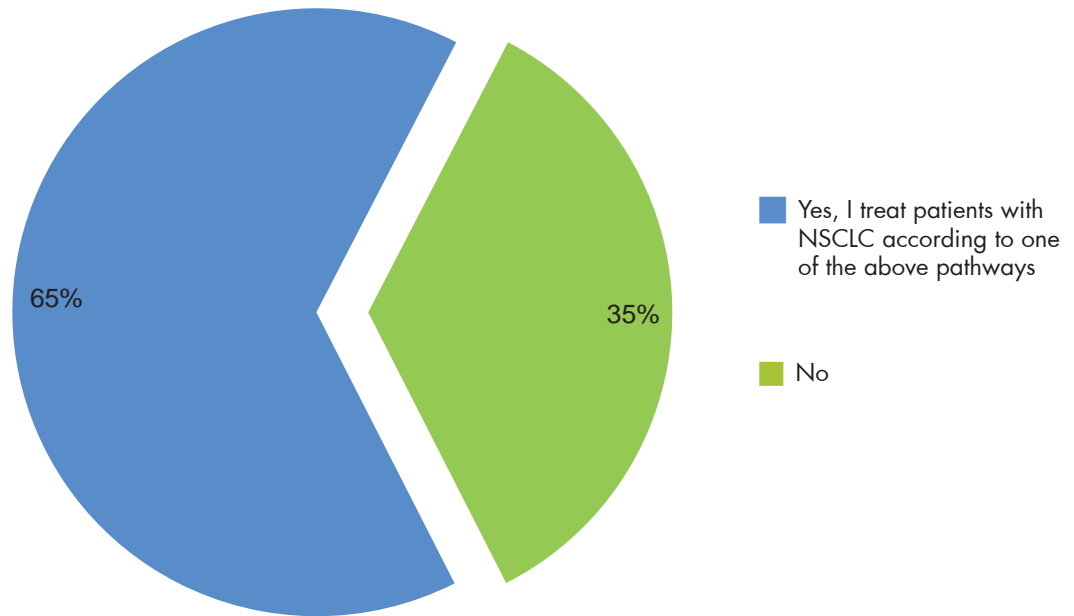

DEMOGRAPHICS†

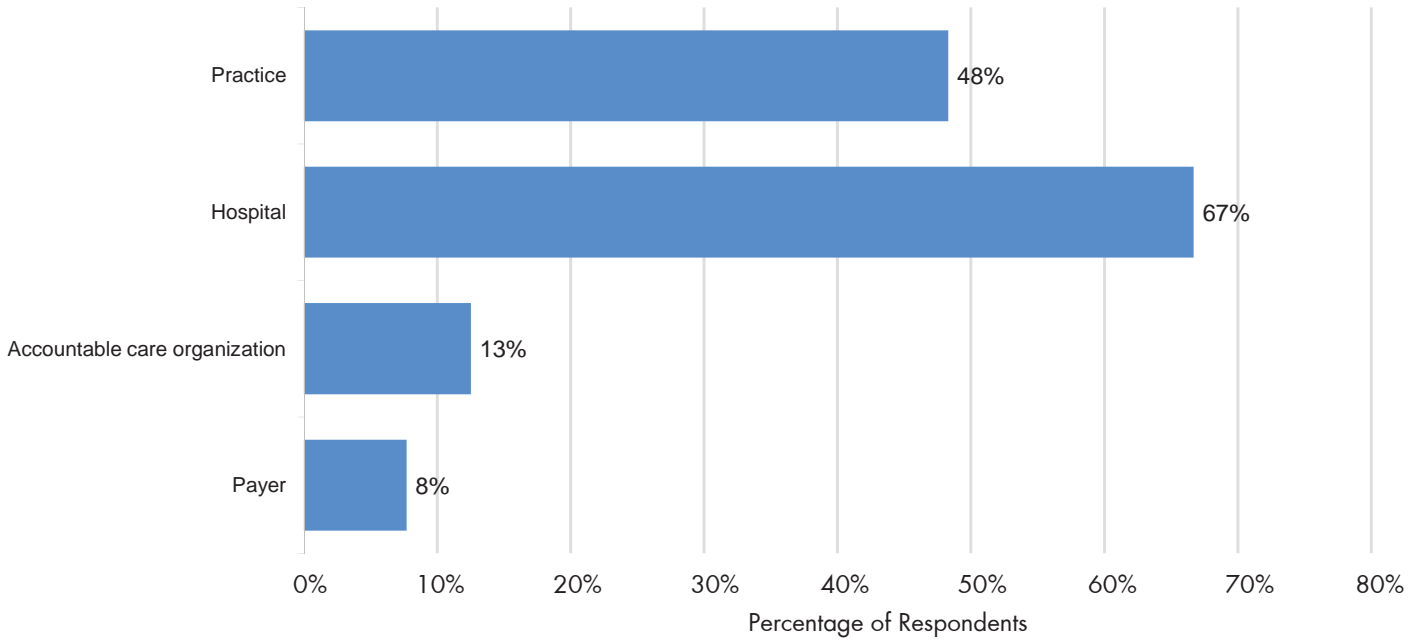
Distribution of Respondent Types (n = 1,055)

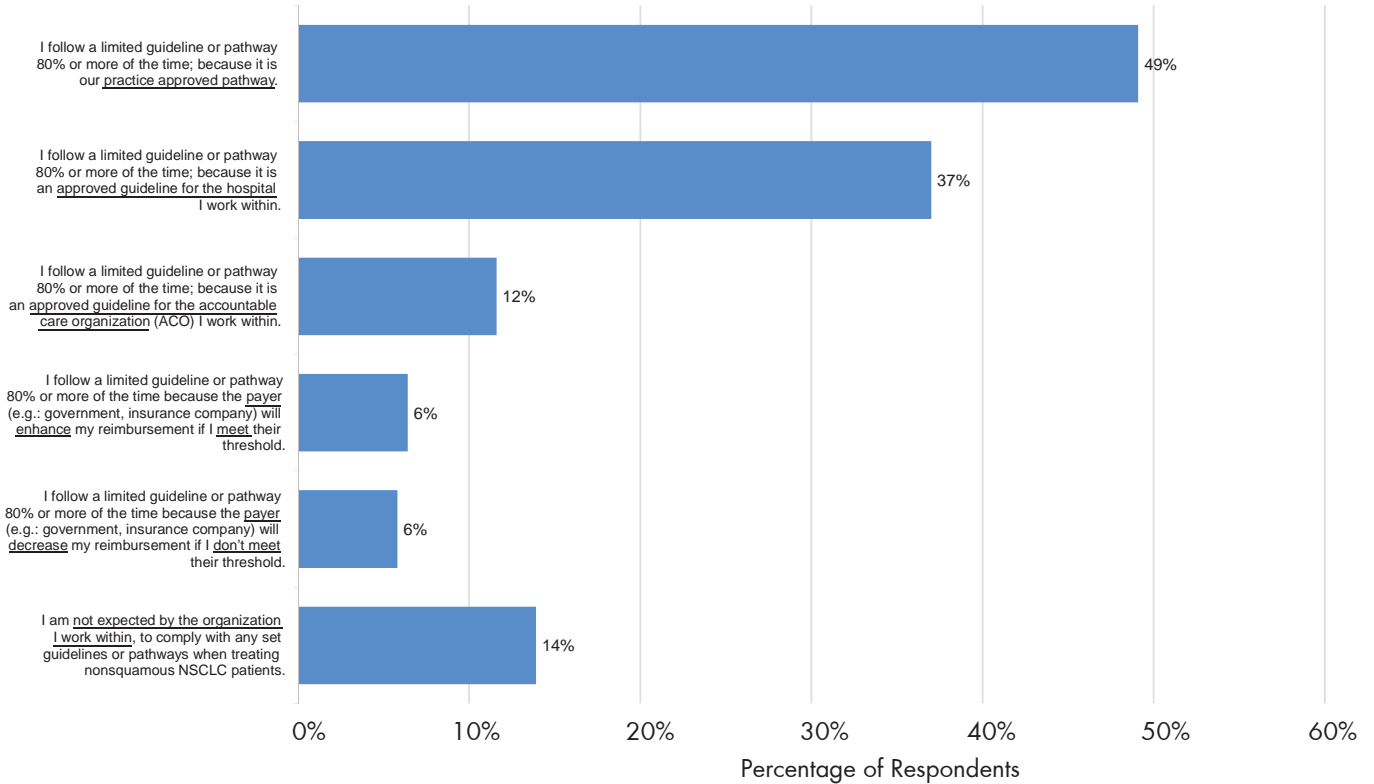


Q2. According to which types of pathways do you currently practice? (select all that apply) (n = 534)
